Mammoth Tusks Found On Footh Creek Near Here

Two mammoth's tusks, part of a jaw bone and teeth have been unearthed in the placer mine on Ed Prefontaine's ranch on Footh Creek, according to Mrs. Scott Young of Gold Hill.

The tusks are not in perfect preservation, Mrs. Young said, but crumbled as the bank fell in the process of mining. A large molar is almost intact and measures six inches by three inches, with prongs one and a half inches in length. The tusks measure seven inches in diameter.

The teeth were imbedded in deep gravel, she stated, and covered with ten or twelve feet of small gravel and top soil.
