

Mammoth Tusks Found On Foots Creek Near Here

Two mammoth's tusks, part of a jaw bone and teeth have been unearthed in the placer mine on Ed mester and maintained an average Prefountaine's ranch on Foots Creek, according to Mrs. Scott Young of Gold Hill.

The tusks are not in perfect preservation, Mrs. Young said, but crumbled as the bank fell in the process of mining. A large molar is almost intact and measures six inches by three inches, with prongs one and a half inches in length. The Third: Lloyd Holafield, Genevic tusks measure seven inches in diameter.




