There were only five or six minutes left to play, with Oregon State still ahead, 7 to 6. Any little thing might be the turning point.

The teams had just lined up, Idaho was about to put the ball in play from punt formation when suddenly Johnny Logan, Oregon State right end, called to the officials to stop the play.

"Wait a minute," said Logan. "Here's an Idaho man hurt."

"And then what? Players, officials and spectators suddenly noted that Logan had left his position and

was supporting Price, the rival Idaho end. Price had been hurt on the preceding play, but in the excitement nobody noticed it. Time was taken out while Idaho made a substitution and Price was led off the field."

With Price helpless, Johnny might have said nothing. He could have let the Idaho play start, then crash through his wobbling rival to break it up, but he wouldn't take any such advantage. That's the kind of a lad Johnny Logan was.

I got the facts about that incident from the Idaho players themselves. At their hotel after the game they were talking about Johnny's action. It made a deep impression on them, and no wonder.
