Tourists Will Leave \$50 For Each Oregonian Is Portland Estimate

The estimated tourist business for 1932, as compiled from figures of the Portland Chamber of Commerce will result in fifty dollars being brought into Oregon for every man, woman and child in the state by out-of-state tourists alone.

The flood of wealth brought into the state by tourists this year will mount past \$50,000,000, it was predicted.

Last year 150,000 foreign automobiles entered Oregon, figuring 450,000 visitors. An average daily expenditure of \$7.50—considered conservative—for an average stay of seven days would aggregate \$25,000,000.

This year tourist inquiries are pouring into the state at double the volume of 1931. The chamber expects twice as many tourists and twice the income.

The estimated average stay of seven days is expected to prove conservative. Thousands who will come to Oregon to attend conventions plan to make extensive side trips through the state, the inquiries indicate.

Last winter the Portland chamber communicated with 2000 persons who had asked for information early in the tourist season. The average person spent 11 days in the state, it was learned.

The 100 per cent increase in interest this year is ascribed to the number of conventions and the 10th Olympiad on the Pacific coast.

The estimates do not include railroad traffic. With the elimination of the coastwise fare differential, that number of tourists coming by rail, is expected to soar.

A compilation made by Ray Conway of the Oregon State Motor association from federal figures shows that the daily foreign tourist mileage in Oregon is greater than in any other western state.

Out-of-state cars drive 434,000 daily in Oregon, according to the survey, while in Washington they travel 357,000, and in California 411,000.

These cars contribute almost \$1500 a day to the state gasoline tax fund—more than \$500,000 a year.

The survey shows that 92.8 per cent of Oregon's automobile tourist traffic comes from states west of the Mississippi river, 5 per cent from east of the river and 2 per cent from Canada.

Inquiries this year indicate lengthy visits. The stacks of letters received Wednesday morning included a half dozen from school teachers

who plan to spend their two-month vacation in Oregon.

One man will bring his wife and child in his private airplane and hop about the state for 65 days. He asked for information on flying conditions and for airport maps.

Several expressed an intention to make a home in Oregon.

The number of inquiries received this year to date is 30,000. In 1931 32,000 inquiries were received all year.

10,852 CITIZENS OF COUNTY VOTED IN THE PRIMARIES

In the primary election Friday, May 20, 10,852 voters went to the polls, out of a total registration of 17,315. This was a fraction more than 61 per cent of the vote—the highest on record for a primary election in this county.

The vote in Gold Hill was 241 out of 442 registered; Foothills 84 out of 113 registered; Jacksonville, north, 199 out of 306, Jacksonville, south, 157 out of 254.
