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row heads which were chipped with a sharp stone fastened to a stick.

For the arrowheads agate and red jasper was used, and those found on this site give another clue to the approximate time in which the tribe lived. Unlike the later Indians' triangular arrow-points which had sharp prongs at the back, these arrow heads were long and oval-shaped, tapering to a sharp point at one end.

Their mortars and pestles were especially crude, most of the mortars found being little more than slightly hollowed flat stones.

The food of these natives was fish, deer and elk meat and meal ground from the acorns in their rude bowls. Three deposits of mussel shells were found also. The teeth of the skeletons were well worn from their coarse food, but were in much better preservation than those of us moderns, although some showed cavities that indicated many a painful toothache.

Dr. Cressman states that at least one settlement was abandoned hastily, for a quantity of the precious red jasper used for arrowheads had been left. Sand strata were quite distinct between the levels of the settlements, and presumably floods

had routed the Indians.

Dr. Cressman has taken the articles he found to the university museum, where he will make further study and comparison with those found at other sites.

He also is interested in a camp in Evans Valley and plans in the near future to study the Indian writings on the cliffs in eastern Oregon. At the foot of the cliffs he hopes to find a burial ground which will yield more information on the earlier inhabitants of Oregon.
