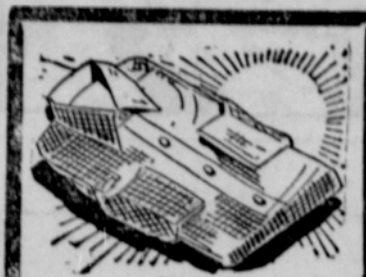

Local People Visit Coast Fire District

Two local people, Mrs. Kate Phillips and Mrs. J. A. Grimes traveled the Redwood highway to Crescent City Sunday and up the coast to Brookings and Gold Beach. They report a bad fire near Patrick's creek on the Redwood highway where fire was burning on both sides of the road and covered a large territory up the side and along the ridge of the mountain.

No Redwood trees had burned

at any point along the highway, they stated, but in Crescent City they learned that fire had damaged Redwood on the old route of the highway into that city.

Smoke was heavy all along the coast where fires are numerous at the head of the Chetco river, and along the highway between Brookings and Gold Beach many acres had burned over with several stretches along the road still on fire. The Colgrove ranch near Gold Beach, one of the finest in that section was completely destroyed. The Meyers creek district had suffered considerably.
