Forest Service Helps Relieve Unemployment

Under the terms of the emergency relief and regular appropriation acts passed by the last Congress, \$1,632,053 will be spent this fiscal year in the national forests of Oregon and Washington for the construction and improvement of forest highways, roads, trails, bridges, lookout cabins and towers and other permanent development projects, according to report of G. J. Buck, chief of the North Pacific region, U. S. forest service. This is the largest sum ever received in one year by the local forest service for road and permanent improvement work, and will assist materially in relieving the unemployment problem.

Of the total federal allotment to the national forests of Oregon and Washington, \$654,362 comes from the Emergency Relief Act signed by President Hoover on July 21, which contained a \$10,000,000 item to be expended in the national forests throughout the country for unemployment relief. The remainder, \$977,691, is a part of the regular department of agriculture appropriation for road and trail construction and protection improvements in the national forests.

"The U. S. forest service," said Mr. Buck, "welcomes the opportunity to give material aid to those who are out of work. We are co-operating closely with local relief agencies, state, county and town, and are hiring no men directly, but selecting our labor supply from those recommended to us by unemployment relief agencies at the 22 headquarters of our forest supervisors in Oregon and Washington."

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Jackson County To Get \$36,945 From Tag Sales

The state highway commission will receive \$2,019,047 from automobile license plates sold during July, August and September, the secretary of state announced last week. A total of \$3,137,991 was collected on sale of license plates during the third quarter of this year, and after expenses are deducted two-thirds is turned over to the commission. The other one-third reverts back to the counties in the proportion automobile licenses are sold. Counties will receive \$1,009,523.

The highway commission, in addition will receive \$110,115 as its three-fourths share of the motor

transportation fund collected during the three months as fees for other than automobile licenses. A total of \$146,821 was collected. Counties will receive \$37,705 of this money.

From the sale of license plates Multnomah county will receive \$424,875 to be applied on roads in that county. Marion county will receive \$68,272, Lane county \$47,946, Clacka-

mas, \$47,892; Jackson county \$30,945 and Washington, \$33,587.

Receipts by other counties include Klamath \$31,702, Umatilla \$25,586, Douglas \$21,670, Baker \$11,783, Benton \$14,896, Josephine \$11,067, and Union county \$14,343.
