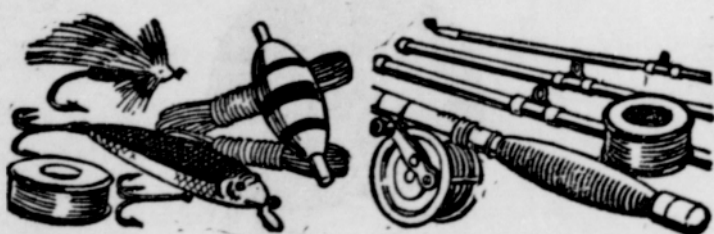

Corvallis June 6-9

Salem, Oregon, Apr. 12 (Special)—Preparations are underway for holding of the Oregon Fireman's School which is conducted annually under the auspices of the Oregon Fire Chiefs association, the engineering of the Oregon State College, the State Board for Vocational Education and the State Fire Marshal department cooperating. This year's school will be held at Corvallis, June 6 to 9, inclusive.
