\$5.00 License Fees Go On Sale Next Month

Changes in automobile license fees and salient points in a car registration procedure are set forth in letters to be sent this week to 250,000 Oregon motor vehicle owners by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, in preparation for the renewal season.

A flat rate of \$5.00 for all private passenger cars for the half year starting July 1, 1933, and subsequent annual fees of \$5.00 are matters of particular interest to motorists this year. The 1933 legislature authorized a reduction in fees effective for the half year and a change to a calendar-year registration system starting January 1, 1934.

Applications for licenses may be sent in at any time and plates or sheriff's temporary permits will be released by mail or at the various registration offices on June 15. All applications on file in the secretary of state's office at Salem by May 27 will be included in a drawing for low license numbers to be held on that date. The practice of eliminating assignments of special numbers, adopted two years ago to expedite release of plates, will be followed again this season but all advance requests will be given an opportunity for low numbers in the drawing.

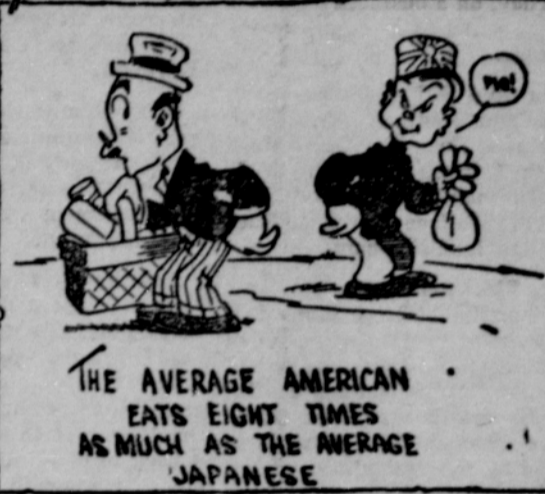
