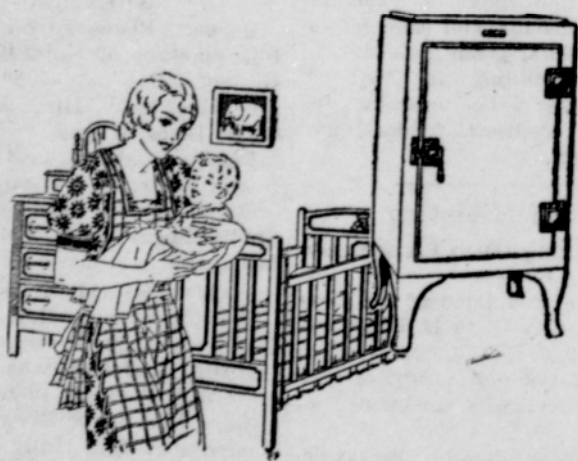

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1096 Pheasants Are
Hatched At State Game
Farm Near Medford

A brand new generation of Chinese pheasants, numbering 1096, is up and about, at the Jackson County branch of the State Game farm, it was announced last week. The new chicks are making themselves heard in field coops at the Medford branch.

A total of 3200 pheasant eggs has been set at the farm, members of the Jackson County Game Protective association announced, and an important increase in the game life of Jackson county is anticipated for the season.

In the list of new chicks is a group whose lives were seriously endangered while yet in the eggs. The mother's nest was broken up by a mowing machine at a local farm. The rancher called the game farm and told the story. First, however, he transported the eggs from the field next to a warm oven in the ranch house. The game farm arranged to move the eggs from the oven to one of the hens, employed as a "setter" at the farm. The move was made and every egg hatched. One hundred and sixty hens have been used to incubate the pheasant eggs at the game farm this season and no more hens are needed. The association expressed appreciation of the splendid cooperation offered by the many people, who assisted in procuring hens for the pheasant hatching season. — Medford Mail-Tribune.

300,000 Drivers Must
Renew Licenses Before
September First

Three hundred thousand Oregon motorists must obtain renewal drivers' licenses before September 1, the first day on which the law requires every motor vehicle operator to have a new-type permit, according to Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state.

This great number, approximately three-quarters of the drivers in the state, may occasion a rush for permits such as swamped examination stations during the last few days preceding June 9, when the motor vehicle laws raised the cost of permits from 50c to \$1. "In the short time from May 1, up to and including June 8, 75,384 persons were examined," Mr. Hoss declared. "The magnitude of this task may be seen by a comparison with the 22-month period between July 1, 1931, and May 1, 1933, when only 21,816 drivers were examined. On June 8, this year 6000 persons were given examinations, with applicants in some localities being taken care of until midnight. Such a congested condition will recur in the weeks just preceding September 1," the secretary of state pointed out, "unless drivers arrange immediately for renewals."

Authority has been given by the legislature to waive examination of renewal applicants, except for those 70 years of age and older, or when, because of obvious physical impairments or a questionable driving record there is reason to believe that an applicant may not be qualified to operate a car in a safe manner. Holders of new-type drivers' licenses and renewals issued since July 1, 1931, need not renew their permits until June 30, 1935, regardless of the expiration date they bear.

In order to obtain a renewal permit, Mr. Hoss warned, it will not be sufficient merely to mail a dollar. The applicant must obtain the regulation application form either by mail from the secretary of state's office in Salem, or from state police, county sheriffs, or examiners. This must be filled out and signed before a notary public or one of the official examiners, all of whom have notaries' commissions, or other persons qualified to administer oaths. State examiners will affix the notary seal free of charge.

An examiner may be located by referring to the printed schedules which may be secured from the secretary of state's office, state police, or sheriffs.

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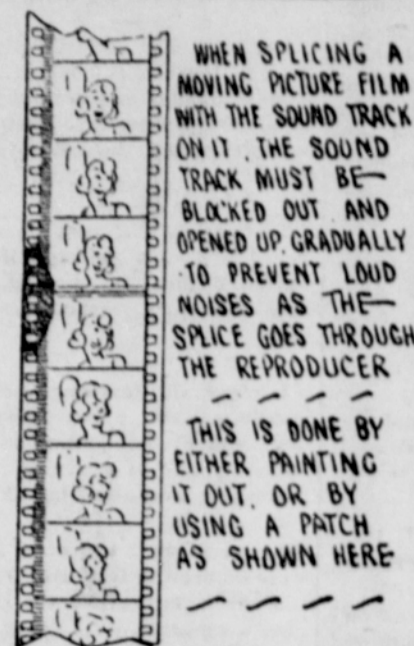

Hints for the
Household

Question: "What is added to whipped cream to make it stay firm like other icing when added to top of cake?"

Answer: There are two additions which can be added to whipped cream to make it firm. A—the white of egg. B—Gelatin.

Method (A): Beat white of egg very stiff. Add gradually to cream which has been whipped very stiff until right consistency is reached. Method (B): Cover a little gelatin with cold water. Add scant cup of boiling water. Stir well. When this starts to thicken, mix with whipped cream. This is what some bakers put in their cream filling for cream puffs.

To Keep Meat Moist

If ham or corn beef are allowed to cool in water in which they are boiled they will keep moist for a long while.

COOKING HINTS

Lemon Sherbert

6 lemons, juice of all, and grated rind of 3.
1 orange, juice and grated rind.
1 pint of hot water (2 cups)
3-4 pint of sugar.

Method: Mix juice, powdered sugar and rind. Pour hot water over mixture. Strain through cheesecloth and freeze.

To Make Frappe

After freezing, add 1 pint cold water to sherbet and you will have a delicious frappe.

How to Prepare Sweetbreads

Soak in lukewarm salted water for 2 hours. Change water several times during this period. Pour off water. Place sweetbreads in boiling water. Simmer for 10 to 15 minutes. Be sure they are firm but not hard. Put in cold water for 10 minutes. Take out. Wipe dry. Set aside until cold. They are now ready to cook any desired way.

String Beans cooked with Cheese
1 quart of string beans.
1 cup of grated cheese.
¼ cup of cream.
Seasoning.
Little butter.

Method: Cut up beans. Put in sauce pan and cover with boiling water. Boil 5 minutes. Simmer slowly for 2 hours. Drain. Put in baking dish. Season. Add ¼ cup of the grated cheese and cream.
Then sprinkle other ¼ cup of grated cheese over the top. Dot with 1 tablespoon of butter. Place under gas flame and reheat until

cheese is toasted.

BAKING HINTS

Coffee Cake

1 cup of brown sugar.
1 h. tablespoon of shortening.
1 cup of milk.
2 cups of flour.
2 tablespoons of baking powder.
Little salt.

Frosting: Butter, brown sugar and little cinnamon.

Method: Mix brown sugar and shortening. Add milk, flour, salt and baking powder. Mix well and pour into shallow bread pan. Dot top plentifully with butter and sprinkle with brown sugar and little cinnamon.

Lemon Pie

Different than you ever tasted.
3 eggs.
1 cup of sugar.

1 lemon (juice).

Method: Separate eggs. Beat egg yolks. Add sugar. Then put juice of 1 lemon in saucepan. Boil well. Slowly add whites—beaten stiff. Then pour into baked pastry shell. You can hold out enough white of egg just to dot the top of pie artistically.

Baked Calves Hearts

4 hearts.
Stuffing.
½ loaf bread, broken into pieces.
1 onion, cut up.
Seasoning.
Pour a little boiling water over mixture. Mix well.

Method: Wash hearts well. Remove fibrous tissues. Fill with dressing. Salt. Roll in flour and sear. Add salt, pepper and butter, and bake 2 or 3 hours. Baste frequently.
