Student Expenses Greatly Reduced at State Schools

EUGENE, ORE.—Student expenses at the state higher educational institutions of Oregon will be the lowest in several years, according to data just issued in a circular on Entrance Information for new students by the Division of Information of the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

Realizing the financial plight of the majority of students, the State Board of Higher Education at its last meeting took action reducing the registration fee at the college and university \$6 a term or \$18 a year. This is a reduction of about 15 per cent and comes on top of a \$5 reduction in the deposit of breakage and loss which was ordered by the Board at a previous meeting. The total student fee at the college and university during the coming year will now be \$32 a term instead of \$38, and the deposit will be \$5 a year instead of \$10.

The board also approved a reduction of \$3 a term at the three normal schools, reducing the tuition and fees from \$17 a term to \$14 a term. In addition to the reduction in fees, students living costs have been lowered during the past year until

at the present time the dormitory board and room charges at the college and university are about \$30 a term or \$90 a year lower than they were a year ago, and about \$20 a term or \$60 a year lower at the Oregon Normal School. The present board and room charges at the college and university amount to about \$70 a term whereas formerly they were approximately \$100 a term.

At the Oregon Normal School, the cost of board and room per term at the dormitories is about \$66 a term as compared to \$84.50 at the beginning of last year. The Normal schools at Ashland and La Grande do not have institutional dormitories but living costs in private homes are reported as being reduced in line with the charges at the other institutions.

Estimates of total student expenses including registration fee, books and supplies, board and room and incidentals at the college and university are placed at about \$170 for one term and \$460 for a year. This is a reduction of about \$100 for the school year under the estimates of last year and about \$150 under the estimates reported in the catalogs of the two institutions two years ago.

At the normal schools the estimate of student costs is \$98.50 for the first term and \$285 for the year, which is about \$45 less than the annual estimate for last year.

These yearly estimates of student expense are based on the regular dormitory charges for board and room but college officials point out that many students are finding it possible to lower these costs considerably through "batching", working for their board and room and through other devices of self help. Institutional officers are cooperating with needy students in making it possible for them to lower their costs through any method which provides proper living condition. Attention is also being given by the faculties to keeping the cost of text books and supplies to a minimum consistent with efficient instruction.

Cost of room and board in private homes and in the fraternity and sorority houses is also reported to be greatly reduced under the figures of the past few years, and studies made of the social costs in fraternities and sororities indicate a marked reduction in these expenditures from several years ago.

Grant Harrison narrowly escaped possibly fatal injury last night when the team which he was driving became frightened from the sudden flashing of the lights of an automobile. The horses ran into a ditch, throwing Mr. Harrison out and causing a compound fracture of the leg. In his efforts to hold his team, he was kicked by one of the horses, breaking two of his ribs and shattering the thumb, on his right hand. He managed to hold his team and climbed into the wagon and drove into town, a distance of about four miles.

The storm of Monday evening was without doubt, the worst that has visited this section in many years, and while no damage was done to crops in this vicinity, yet considerable damage was done to buildings and electric light and telephone poles by the wind and lightning.

The Gold Hill baseball team received a severe walloping at the hands of the Central Point team Sunday, on the Central Point diamond. At the finish Central Point had twenty runs to their credit while the local boys could only sum up eight. The Gold Hill boys have played in pretty hard luck during the last few games and it is now up to them to do something to get back their lost honors.

The horse attached to W. A. Carter's delivery rig took a spin down the street Wednesday and in his haste to get to the barn left most of the harness and rig scattered about different portions of the town. He was being driven by Nolan Hamersley, who tied him to a tree at Mr. Carter's House, using the line for a hitching strap. The line was tied in such a manner as to cause him to back up until the line gave away. The buggy and harness were pretty badly broken up.

The county road, between Gold Hill and the Sardine creek bridge is being straightened and removed some distance from the railroad track. This road has never been on public land and the change has been made necessary on account of the property being bought by John Ritter who is now fencing the land where the road formerly was. Mr. Ritter will open a wood yard at this place.

Travelers Urged to Be On Watch for Missing Pilot

In a last effort to locate the Portland Airways' missing pilot and plane, Bill Young, who was reported missing June 16 after he had left Medford enroute to Portland, the company today issued an appeal to vacationists and travelers generally to be on the lookout for any trace of the plane or pilot.

A \$500 reward offered by the lost pilot's father, John E. Young, former Portland fire chief, for recovery of the flier or his body is unclaimed. None has reported finding a flare or fragment of the large Stinson plane in which the pilot left Medford at 11:50 a. m. Friday, June 16.

William Foster, president of Portland Airways, has given out a description of the plane in the hope that vacationists may recognize it afar. It is a silver and black monoplane, the silver in the design of a triangle on the wing. The wing bears the department of commerce numbers, "NC 10820" in three-foot height, red letters.

The wing spread of the ship is 42 feet and the fuselage is black. There is considerable glass in the cabin, which if scattered in a crash, might throw off a reflection in the sunlight. Young was wearing an orange sweater and a tan leather jacket.

State Insurance

Commissioner Gives

Timely Warning

SALEM, ORE.—Oregonians are spending hundreds of dollars yearly with unlicensed, unqualified and so-called protective, non-profit organizations for insurance benefits rarely given, according to A. H. Averill, insurance commissioner. Despite repeated warnings from his office through the medium of the press cautioning the public to beware of strangers representing concerns of this class, these operatives still succeed in selling worthless policies and collecting money from people who can least afford to lose.

The latest to invade Oregon territory, which have come to the attention of the insurance department, are two so-called burial associations known as the National Burial Association of America and the New Deal Burial Association, both of Dallas, Texas, and Mr. Averill requests that agents representing these concerns be reported immediately to the state police or to his office, as it is only with the cooperation of the public that progress can be made towards stamping out this illegal practice.

State Game Commission

Opens Hunting Territory

Season and bag limit regulations established for the 1933 hunting season have provided new open areas and additional hunting time is several counties of the state according to statement made today by the Oregon State Game Commission. This is particularly true of upland game birds, and with the short open season on elk in four northeastern Oregon counties, sportsmen of Oregon may look forward to a good hunting season.

Conditions in the field are reported as excellent on both birds and mammals with the exception of white-tail deer and sage hens, both of which species are losing ground and on both of which closed seasons have been ordered this year.

Requests of sportsmen on the west slope of the Cascades that the quail and grouse season be concurrent with the China pheasant season have been granted.

Regulations governing the season on migratory waterfowl will be made public as soon as information is received from the Federal Advisory Board.

A complete printed synopsis which will supersede all other orders will be in the hands of all county clerks and license agents by the 14th of August when regulations become effective.
