

Opening Day Crowds At State Fair Break Records

Salem, Ore., Sept. 6—Oregon's 72nd annual State Fair got off to a flying start here this week, with Labor Day crowds setting a new attendance record. The holiday date and a twenty-five cent admission to the fairgrounds aided in breaking old-time marks.

The presentation of the world's largest bouquet was attended by thousands with many more clamoring to get into the Agricultural building. Mrs. Julius L. Meier received the bouquet from J. O. Holt of Eugene, chairman of the Board of Agriculture.

Exhibits this year also set a new high mark. A new interest seemed to premeate every department of the fair.

And then, of course, every afternoon so far has seen capacity competitive rodeo events—bronc riding, bull-dogging, and Brahama crowds at the horse races. With pari-mutuel wagering being tried at the fairgrounds, interest has ran high. Thrilling races have been won and lost, with a long-shot coming in first every once in awhile for a large pay-off for the lucky ticket holder.

The parachute race preceding the horse racing has been more than

barge in in thrills. The sight of seeing two men drop through space has been too much for several women's ectators and first aid has had to be administered.

Jim McCleave and his highly-educated horses continue to thrill at the big free night Gymkhana. Special lights have made the grandstand and surroundings as bright as daylight. Sandwiched in between McCleave's acts have been three steer riding. Cow hands from all sections of the west are here for these nightly contests.

More than 25,000 watts more of light have made the midway, from the grandstand building to the machinery building, one dazzling fairland. The carnivals are more crowded than ever.

Navy Quota Calls for 80 Recruits Each Month

The headquarters office for Navy recruiting for the Washington-Oregon district, located in Portland, has recently announced that after a long period of restricted recruiting, they are now assigned a quota of about eighty men each month for the next several months.

After the almost complete lack of vacancies during the past several months, this sudden call for a large number of men opens up a field of opportunity to many that have felt that the chances for a naval career were closed to them. The recent decisions of the government to maintain the national defense at its highest peak of efficiency, with a minimum expenditure, for safeguarding the interests of the country has caused this sudden increase in enlistments.

The Portland office accentuates the requirements for enlistment, namely: an applicant must be a United States citizen, be between the ages of seventeen and twenty-four inclusive, must have at least a grade school education, be of up-standing character, must have no dependents, have a clear police and juvenile court record, must be able to pass the required physical and mental examinations and be able to supply references as to character.

A great many young men who have applied and were unable to enlist due to lack of vacancies, may now find this field of opportunity opened up to them. Any young men desiring further information concerning enlistments in the Navy should see their postmaster or the recruiting officer in the U. S. Court House at Portland, Oregon.

Rigid Tests for School Bus and Drivers Ordered

Rigid enforcement of the traffic rules and regulations covering school busses, has been decided upon by the state police and the district attorney's office. All school busses will be inspected before the opening of school, or as soon thereafter as possible.

The last legislature passed a law requiring that all school busses have a sign, front and rear, bearing the words "School Bus," in letters six inches high, and in a color making them plainly visible. The signs can not be written or painted on a board or piece of pasteboard, but must be plain, legible, neatly printed, and of durable finish.

The regulations also require that the door be under the control of the driver, so the child passengers can not open it, and cause accident hazards.

School busses are required to have brakes in perfect condition, windshield wiper, mirror, and other standard equipment, including a solid running board in good condition.

The driver of the school bus must secure a chauffeur's license, pass the driver's license requirements, and stop at all railroad crossings, when carrying passengers.

Captain Lee M. Bown of the state police said all school busses in service, "will be given close scrutiny and inspection, because in case of an accident, there are too many children at stake."

Both the state police and District Attorney Coddling asked for the cooperation of bus drivers and school boards, in observance of the regulations.

GABLE PLAYS GAMBLER IN STARRING FILM, 'NO MAN OF HER OWN'

"No Man of Her Own," a dramatic story of a gambler and his women, starring Clark Gable and featuring Carol Lombard and Dorothy Mackaill, will be the attraction at the Roxy Theatre beginning Sunday.

\$140,000 AUGUST EXPENSE OF CCC

During the month of August \$140,000 was spent by the CCC headquarters in this district, including salaries to the recruits, a large percentage of which is sent home. The figures as compiled by Lieutenant Robert T. Frederick, district adjutant show that \$82,000 was paid in salaries to the CCC boys, and \$36,500 for food. Pay for officials, doctors, etc. totaled \$8500.

Expenditures for miscellaneous supplies, and other articles were \$4500. For youths that quitted the camps, and were sent to their homes, mostly in Illinois and Missouri, \$3300 was spent in railroad fares.

HOARDER DEADLINE SET FOR SEPTEMBER 18TH

The United States treasury department last week extended until September 18 the deadline when persons in possession of gold coin, bullion or certificates must report their holdings to the government under President Roosevelt's latest anti-gold hoarding order. The previous deadline was September 12.

Special additional extensions up to October 12 are authorized. Forms for making returns will be available at the treasury, federal reserve banks and offices of internal revenue collections.
