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Many Hunters Take to Field As Season Opens

Sportsmen who have enjoyed a fine year of fishing and those who have been after the early grouse hunting in Eastern Oregon, are rallying this week for the opening of the deer season all over Oregon, the big annual event of the 50,000 hunters of the state.

Buck deer with the forked horns, open season September 20 to October 25, both dates inclusive, reads the hunting synopsis of Oregon laws, and never more earnestly than this year, are the riflemen seeking the bag limit of two Columbia black-tail deer or one mule deer. A surge of delayed license sales is reported from over the state and a ten per cent kill of the estimated 100,000

deer in the state is expected. This will be in keeping with the approximate figures for the past two years, according to the Oregon state game commission.

Chance of a big bull elk in the record of kill this season for the first time in more than 20 years, is an added incentive to many nimrods and elk tags, an additional requirement, are said to be in good demand. Prediction is freely made in the elk country, however, that less than 500 bull elk will be taken this year.

Bear also are included in the bag limits of big game and no state of the Union offers a bigger bag of big game and game birds and a longer season of shooting than Oregon, the game commission announces. The blacktail deer are found on the west slopes of the Cascades and right through to the Oregon coast while the big mule deer are native only to Eastern Oregon. Scarcely a county in the state but what will yield its quota of venison this season.

Few are the areas closed outright to entry by hunters, but more areas require an entry or fire permit, it is announced by the forestry officials. Game officials urge all sportsmen to comply with the fire regulations and to be particularly careful about watching for the horns this season before shooting as there are about 12,000 extra workers in the national forests, most of whom are dressed in olive drab colors. "It would be an unfortunate indictment of sportsmen in this state if an increase in the number of hunting fatalities was reported," Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor declared.

Home-Made Trucks Need New License

For the benefit of all persons in the valley who have converted pleasure cars into trucks or pickups during the past year, the state police announce that a change in license must be made and that officers have been instructed to proceed with arrests where such changes have not been made.

All such cars must carry "T" license plates. Blanks for application for such plates may be obtained at the state police headquarters or from the sheriff's office. Ordinary plates will be approved only on touring cars, used for that purpose exclusively.

SHADE SAVES SNOW

How a forest cover retards the melting of snow in Douglas fir woods was observed at the Wind river (Washington) branch of the federal forest experiment station this spring. In open cut-over land the snow had melted by April 20; in partly cut-over land some of it lasted until May 1, while in virgin woods it was not gone until May 12.

O. S. C. Opens Football Season With Double Bill

Oregon State College, Corvallis, September 20—Oregon State college football players will open their season here Saturday, September 23 in a double-header with Willamette university and Southern Oregon Normal non-conference opponents. The first game will start at 1:30 o'clock.

Lon Stiner, new Orange coach, probably will use most of the half hundred football candidates who have been practicing here twice daily for nearly a week in the games Saturday. Of this group 17 are lettermen.

Finding capable ends and developing reserves for nearly every position are the big worries of Stiner at present. Vic Curtin, regular center last year, has been shifted back to right end, the post he held as a sophomore. Mill Campbell, reserve; Woody Joslin, Maynard Schultz and Bill Jessup, sophomores, are other candidates for the terminals.

With nine lettermen and several promising prospects, available for backfield berths, Coach Stiner has turned most of the backfield duties over to George Scott, assistant coach, and has directed his attention to the line. Stiner himself was an all-American tackle at Nebraska. Scott was a sensational half-back at Oregon State several years ago and a successful coach at Baker high the last two years. Helping Stiner with the forward wall is Jim Dixon, outstanding tackle while playing for Oregon State. Slat Gill, freshman football coach will work with the varsity until rook practice starts. Grant Swan is trainer.
