State Institutions

Cultivate Much Land

Land under cultivation by the 11 state institutions totals 3,276 acres and total value of farm and garden products raised on it for the month of April was \$14,421.64, according to reports of superintendents filed with the Oregon State Board of control.

Institutional population at the end of April was 6,016, a decrease under the 6,042 inmates housed at the end of March, but an increase of 122 over April of the previous year when 5,894 persons were wards of the state. The Oregon State hospital had the greatest population with 2,235 patients, and the Eastern Oregon State hospital at Pendleton was second, with 1,306. These two hospitals had 137 more on their rolls than a year ago.

The other institutions reported the following number of inmates: Oregon Fairview home (for the feeble-minded), 901; Oregon State Penitentiary, 767; State Tuberculosis hospital, 261; Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles, 134; State School for the deaf, 115; Oregon State Training school at Woodburn, 108; State Industrial school for girls, 70; Oregon Blind Trades school at Portland, 62; State School for the Blind, 57.

Per capita cost, averaged for the entire group, was \$30.23 for April, as compared to \$30.40 in April, 1933. Lowest cost per patient was that of the Eastern Oregon State hospital with \$12.62, while the Oregon State hospital ranked second with \$12.90, and the Oregon Fairview home, third, with \$13.71. The penitentiary's cost per inmate was \$21.64, and the institutions with smaller populations ranged as follows: State Tuberculosis hospital, \$40.51; Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital, \$46.31; State Training school, \$36.34; Industrial school, \$31.86; Blind school, \$39.84; Deaf school, \$42.88; and Blind Trades school, \$33.91. Certain hospitalization expenses and special treatment requirements for inmates result in increase in per capita costs at some of the institutions.

Jubilee Visitors Begin to Arrive in Medford

The advance guard of the thousands of visitors expected in Medford and Jacksonville for Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration next June 3 to 9 are beginning to arrive in Medford. A special committee is completing preparations to provide for the housing of the expected throngs.

While hotels, rooming houses and auto camps will provide for the needs of many visitors, efforts have been underway for sometime to contact all residents having extra rooms which could be used for the benefit of persons unable to obtain accommodations at hotels. Reports have been consistently received of the arrival and expected arrival of visitors from numerous distant points to participate in Oregon's birthday celebration.

While Jubilee week was primarily inspired by the opportunity of statehood anniversary observance

and the payment of homage to the pioneers of long ago, the week will be without dull moments. Entertainment of all kinds will be provided. Thrills will be found in Oregon's Diamond Jubilee roundup, presented for four afternoons for cash prizes in bulldogging, steer roping, bronco riding, bareback bronc riding and other contests. Four official Jubilee dances will

be presented Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday night, with dances scheduled for Monday and Tuesday. An Indian village, with real Indians living as they did 100 years ago, will be featured, as well as one of the best carnivals in the west.

An aviation show on Saturday, with scores of ships arriving from the northwest and California, will

be another noteworthy attraction, with special stunts presented throughout the day. There will be special attractions in Ashland on Education Day, Tuesday, June 5, followed by special attractions in the historic gold mining town of Jacksonville, Thursday. A pageant "Oyer-Un-Gon," depicting Oregon history will be presented Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evening.
