Thousands Attend Huge Grants Pass Celebration

The majority of Gold Hill's population swelled the ranks of the largest crowd Grants Pass has entertained in years, at the Fourth of July celebration held there Wednesday.

The big parade at 11:00 called many who left in the morning, ate picnic dinner in the park, and remained for the evening fireworks, and the dance.

The fine city park along Rogue River attracted the crowds most of the day, and water sports, the coronation of the Cave Queen, exhibition of Central Point grange drill team, and an address by Col. E. M. Tandy filled the early afternoon hours there, followed by tennis and horseshoe pitching matches.

At the fair grounds horse races, and a baseball game between Medford and Grants Pass, were on the program, and in the evening a drum corps exhibition and wrestling matches entertained large crowds. During the fireworks the crowds in the grandstand and bleachers overflowed onto the racetrack while the thousands watched the excellent display.

Other events included a 40 ft 8 ft parade and wreck on Main street at 5:00 and a water hose fight on G street at 6:00.

The celebration will go down in history as one of the most successful events ever sponsored in Southern Oregon, and many were heard to remark that they hope the Grants Pass American Legion will continue to promote such observances in the future.

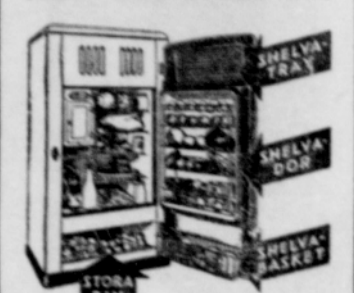
