Over the State

Heavy Rains Delay
Train Near Talent—

Heavy rains in the Talent and Phoenix districts last Friday night washed out a section of the Southern Pacific tracks and caused slight delays in trains. The Pacific highway was under water for a short time near Talent, where several inches of rain fell within a short time. There was no damage to fruit.

Five Convicts Back in
Pen After Short Escape—

Five hungry trustees of the state penitentiary in Salem were recaptured near Sweet Home last Friday after a break for liberty a few hours before. The men were found in a wooded section by a party of loggers. The loggers received \$250 for the capture as the state allows \$50 award for the capture of escaped convicts.

Baker to Build New
School Building—

By a majority vote in a special election in Baker last Friday, citizens of that city approved the issuance of \$100,000 worth of bonds to build a new two-story junior high school building. The school district will make application for State Emergency Relief Administration funds with which to pay labor.

B. L. Eddy's Name
Not on Ballot—

The name of Circuit Judge B. L. Eddy of Roseburg, will not be on the ballot in the fall election, according to a decision of Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle handed down last week. Eddy was last in a field of four candidates in the May primary, although he was defeated by but a few votes. Carl E. Wimberly defeated Eddy. G. F. Skipworth and James T. Brand are the other two judges nominated.

2350 Visitors at Crater
Park on July 4th—

Travel into the Crater Lake park is approximately 80 per cent higher this season over last, according to park officials. On the Fourth of July 2350 visitors were at the lake. Nearly 50,000 people have been at the lake this season.

U. O. Summer Session
Enrollment Larger

Eugene, Oregon—Enrollment at the University of Oregon summer session neared the 600 mark at the end of the second week, when the total climbed to 576. Since there is no penalty for late registration, several students are expected to complete registration in the near future.

This is a marked increase over the total of last summer, when the number reached 450. Other state institutions holding summer sessions also show an increase, it is stated. With 590 students enrolled early in the Portland session, special and regular student late enrollments are expected to bring this total to 800.

Growing interest in specialized fields of education, especially those concerned with teaching children with learning difficulties, is indicated at Eugene, where the class in psychology of typical children under Dr. B. W. DeBusk leads all others with an enrollment of 60. Two other courses, one in secondary education and the other in educational psychology, have 46 members each.

GRANTS PASS, ORE.A New Note in
Forest Fire Prevention

Forest fire prevention never has been of such serious importance as it is in this present season, according to a statement just issued by Regional Forester C. J. Buck.

Federal, state and private forest agencies, uniting under the leadership of a forest minded President, are engaged in a mighty drive to protect young forest growth, and to perpetuate the producing power of forest growing lands. This is of particular significance to the Pacific Northwest, where so much of the social and economic structure is dependent upon the products of the forest, according to Mr. Buck.

"The President is squarely behind the movement for forest protection and conservation as a measure of national recovery and safety," said the Regional Forester. "We are bending every effort to keep the forests free from fire, since this is the very essence of good forestry. Under Article Ten of the lumber code, members of the logging industry voluntarily are undertaking comprehensive fire prevention measures in their operations. They also are pledged to leave their cut-over lands in condition for restocking, by falling all snags and leaving enough timber uncut to supply seed for cutover areas. They deserve full credit and cooperation in this effort, which opens a new epoch in the logging industry. Fire can quickly undo all of this work. For any citizen to start a forest fire, either carelessly or wilfully, in the face of these measures, is decidedly unpatriotic, to say the least."

According to forest service reports, there have been 292 forest fires started on the national forests of Oregon and Washington already this season. Of these, 135 were man-caused fires, 84 were attributed to campers and smokers; while 21 were of incendiary origin.

ON OREGON FARMS

LAKEVIEW—Lake county farmers are showing a markedly increased interest in Union Beardless barley in recent years, according to Victor W. Johnson, county agent, who reports that there are now more than 400 acres of this crop in the county, most of which will be cut for hay. This beardless barley was introduced into Lake county in 1927 by the state college extension service, and the first seed was planted by C. W. Ogle of the Idaho district.

CANYON CITY—The grasshopper menace in Grant county, so far as a serious infestation goes, is a thing of the past for this year, reports County Agent R. G. Johnston. The Logan Valley Cattlemen's association worked diligently and with federal aid for supplies has completely wiped out the beds in that district, Mr. Johnston says, thus saving summer feed for at least 4000 head of cattle. The main beds in the Fox Valley district were also poisoned and killed out before the hoppers spread very badly.

CORVALLIS—The ordinary goat-weed which thrives so abundantly in many sections may look to many persons like a perennial because it continues to flourish year after year, but it is really an annual plant, says W. S. Averill, county agent. In most places where goat weed has been growing the seed has fallen on the ground for a good many years, Mr. Averill says, and those seeds will continue to come up for several years. It is not necessary to treat goat weed with chemicals to kill it, however. Just cutting them off with a mowing machine so that they won't go to seed will take care of this year's growth, he says.

Hints for the
Household

There are few people, indeed, in this world of ours who have never tasted lemonade. But, as most of us can testify, there are "lemonades AND lemonades." And, sometimes we get tired of the sameness in the taste. It is hard, we know, for the maker to change the drink each time, but perhaps a few suggestions for varying the popular thirst quencher will not come amiss.

"Pepping Up" Lemonade
One of the quickest ways of giving a new delightful flavor is to put a few drops of essence of peppermint into a pitcher of plain lemonade.

Pineapple, peach, currant, strawberry, raspberry, cherry or orange juice adds zest to it.

Ginger ale, grape juice or charged water makes a sparkling drink of the prosaic glassful.

Grenadine or creme de menthe will color as well as flavor the liquid.

DO YOU KNOW:

That—creamed potatoes, peas and tomato sauce are the proper things to serve with lamb chops?

THAT—

A "four-minute egg" boiled will have a liquid yolk and solid white? To be most digestible an egg should be cooked slowly and not boiled until hard.

THAT—

It is easier to boil potatoes in the skins and peel them afterward for mashing or creaming because then the skin will slip off.

RECIPES

Maryland Ice
2 quarts of strawberries
2 pounds of granulated sugar
½ cup of chopped nuts
1 pint of cream
1 teaspoon of vanilla
Mash berries with granulated

sugar and let stand for one hour; strain through a cloth. Add an equal measure of water to the juice. Pack in freezer and begin to freeze. Remove dasher and pack ice quite solid. Let stand for twenty minutes. Open and scoop out center to bottom leaving an even portion around all sides.

Mix cream, powdered sugar and vanilla; when ice cold beat until stiff and dry; stir in nuts. Pour mixture into cavity in the freezer; set away and allow to freeze hard.

When ready to serve, remove tin and wrap a warm cloth around it for just a moment. Then turn contents out on platter.
