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Enrollment to be Over 2500 at U. of O. This Year

An increase in full time students approximately 20 per cent will be shown by the University of Oregon this fall, it is announced by C. L. Constance, registrar. At noon October 6 the enrollment reached 2448, compared to 2051 at this time a year ago. Since 71 students entered after this time last year, the figure is certain to go over 2500 this fall, it is pointed out.

Of the total, approximately 1000 are new students, an increase of

approximately 50 per cent over last fall. Freshmen will total about 900, compared to 600 enrolled in the fall term of 1933.

Every section of the state and many other parts of the United States are represented in the student body this year. Student also are better prepared financially. Virgil Earl, dean of men, says, since there has been less demand for student loans so far this term.

Congressman Mott led the fight in the House which forced the vote on the Senate amendments restoring compensation of disabled World War veterans, this record reveals.

He also fought against the so-called Economy Act which reduced by 54 per cent the compensation of veterans suffering from disabilities actually incurred in line of duty.

With such a record in his initial term at the national capital, Congressman Mott will be looked to as a champion of the veterans' interests and will be a respected figure in all veteran legislation if returned to Washington, his Oregon comrades predict.

Melon, Tomato Marketing Agreement Ceases for Year

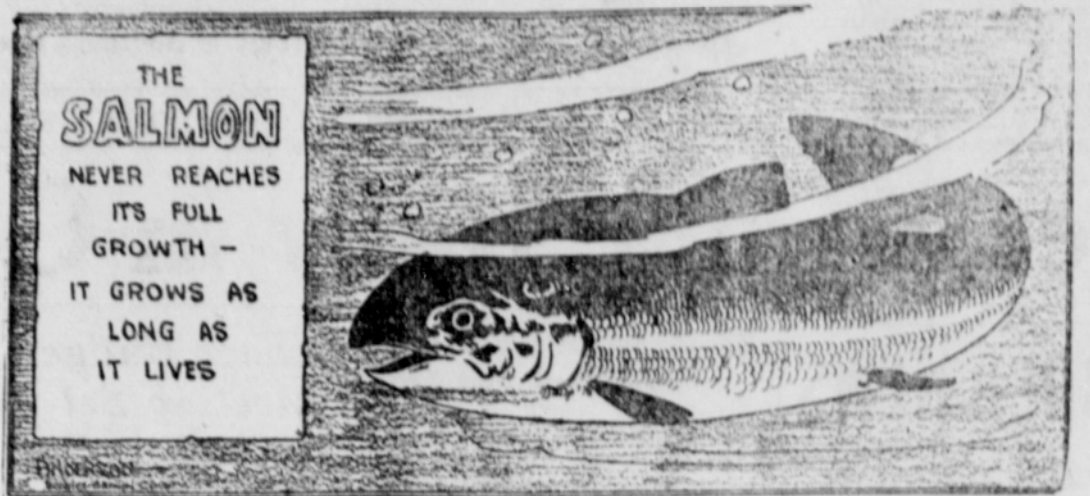

Tomato marketing agreement at 516 Oregon Building, Portland, Oregon, before November 1," said Morton Tompkins, chairman of the agreement's control board.

"Growers should hold receipts that they have received for stamps purchased because there may be a refund by the agreement after expenses and a sinking fund for next year have been deducted. Distribution of the fund will be determined from the receipts issued to the buyer when the stamps were bought."

"Growers are asked to sign and return acreage cards promptly in order that the office may have a permanent record of growers and their crops. This information will be of great assistance in forming for next year. These acreage cards may be obtained from the county agent in the various counties of the two

states."

"We wish to express our appreciation of the cooperation we have received from the various sources, and feel that this cooperation was

due to a hope that this agreement might open the way to the growers getting cost of production which they must have if they continue to feed and clothe the world."
