

Baseball Tournament is Feature of Eagles Meet

The strongest bush league teams in southwestern Oregon will be pitted against each other in the baseball tournament to be played on the Grants Pass fairgrounds diamond during the Eagles state convention, in that city July 4, 5, and 6.

Claude Gotschall, general chairman for the convention, and Ken Williams, ex-major-league and baseball chairman, are working with Fred Roper, secretary of the championship Grants Pass Merchants, in arranging a schedule that will attract hundreds of fans from the visiting Eagles.

So far 1400 reservations have been received by the housing committee from the 32 aeries over the state.

Preparations for the elaborate convention program are proceeding under Gotschall's direction and these are expected to be off the press about the middle of June for issuance to aerie secretaries before the convention.

Illuminated floats, colored lights, beautiful "Cavewomen," and a musical program will combine to make the "Venetian Nights" fete one of the most inspiring events ever staged on the Rogue river at the site of Grants Pass' beautiful city park. H. J. Skow and his committee are making arrangements to seat the thousands of delegates and visitors that will be in Grants Pass for this colorful program.

Banners, streamers, placards and flags have been ordered for decoration of the streets and stores of "The Climate City" and Marshall Merrill, decorating chairman, is confident his committee will give the town a real convention atmosphere.

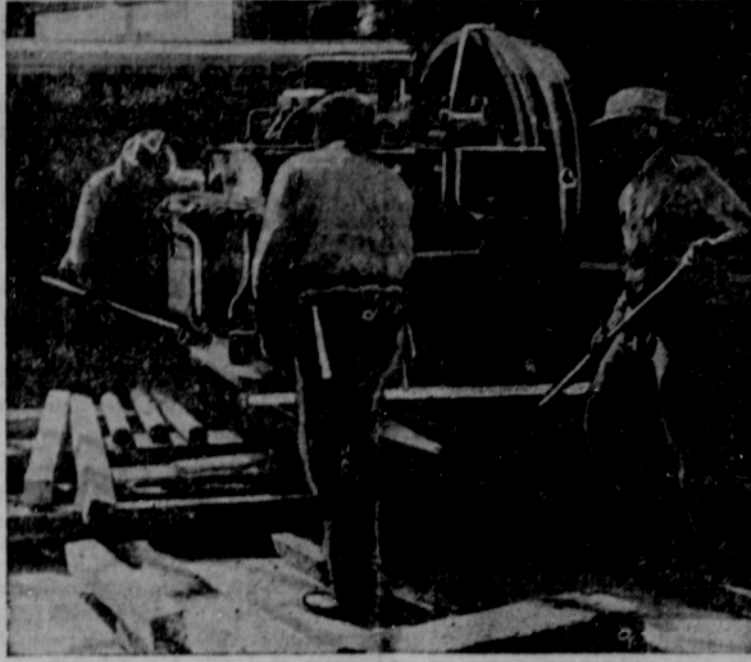

Moving Exhibit Machinery



As soon as the concrete floor in the Ford Exposition Building at the California Pacific International Exposition, San Diego, became fixed, the machinery for the great exhibit began to pour in from the waiting cars. Here is seen the first, a National hot header, used in "upsetting" hot steel bars approximately three-quarters of an inch in diameter. These bars are formed into drag links on the finished Ford automobiles.

April Auto Deaths Drop 50 Per Cent

A 50 per cent cut in automobile fatalities in Oregon was recorded by Earl Snell, secretary of state, for the month of April, 1935, as compared to April of the preceding year, in a compilation released this week.

Only 17 persons lost their lives as a result of motor vehicle crashes in April, while a year ago 33 deaths resulted from similar causes. The favorable record for the month helped materially in improving the report of fatalities for the year in Oregon, the total for four months being 74 during 1935 and 86 in 1934, a reduction of 14 per cent.

In spite of the improved fatality record, the total number of motor vehicle accidents increased during the month of April over the year prior rising from 1,718 in 1934 to 1,736 in 1935. Accidents for the first four months totaled 6,735, a little under the 1934 mark of 6,899.

Injuries resulting from automobile accidents numbered 433 this April and 443 in April, 1934, while the year's total for the period ending April 30 was 1,591, as compared to 1,596 last year.

Eight pedestrians were among the fatally injured persons in April, comprising virtually half of the number killed. One death was the result of a railroad and motor vehicle collision.

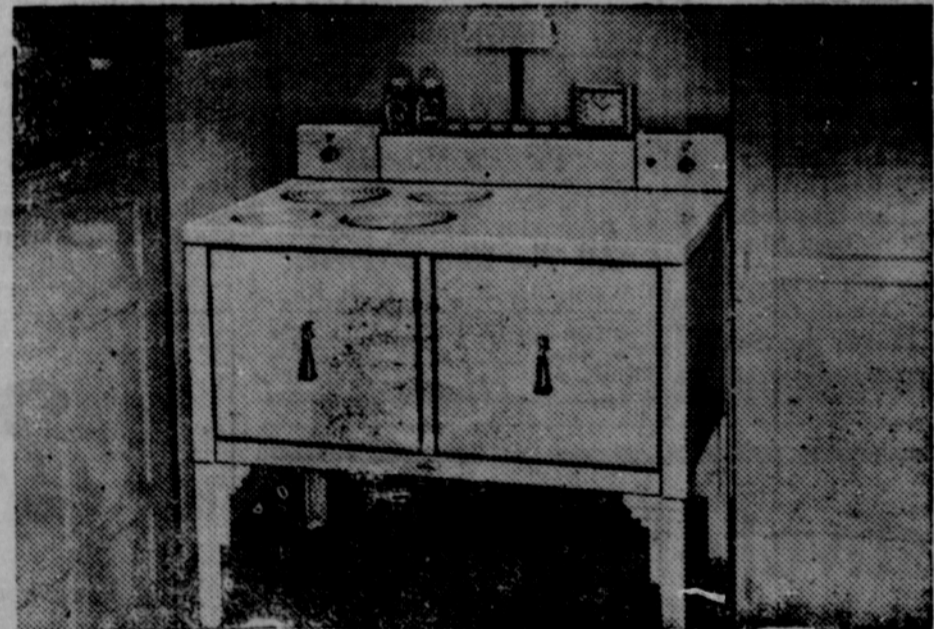
