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## HOW GOLD HILL CAST BALLOTS FRIDAY

Voters of Gold Hill cast 245 ballots at the primary election last Friday. There are approximately 450 registered in this precinct making slightly more than a 50 per cent ballot cast here. This percentage is high compared to the rest of the county and state, which averaged only 30 per cent.

The balloting for candidates here went about the same as the county in general although a few of the races were much closer.

The contract calls for three coats of paint on the city hall and two coats on the other small buildings on the grounds. Work will start in the near future with the job to be completed some time in June.

## Exercises Held for Gold Hill and S. Valley Seniors

Baccalaureate and commencement exercises for the Class of 1936 were attended by large crowds who gathered at both events to honor the five members of this year's class completing the work at Gold Hill high school.

Fine addresses were heard both evenings, and well rounded programs of music and special numbers helped to make the exercises a fitting climax to the school careers of the graduates.

Mr. A. Bower Sageser, professor of history at Southern Oregon Normal school, in delivering the commencement address, "An Evaluation of Present Social Trends," pointed out to the class that they were more fortunate than graduates of recent "depression" years. He stated that unlimited opportunities offered in the fields of politics, science, art, and so forth.

He added also, that the trend now was toward group welfare, instead of individual rights and privileges, and that progress was now being measured, not in terms of industrial achievement, but in terms of higher standards of living which provided culture, comfort and security.

In closing he told the class to train themselves well for the field in which they wished to succeed, but to train themselves, also, along lines which will fit into the new trend toward group welfare.

Awards Presented  
Special awards earned by the students were presented by Supt. L. T. Cook, Miss Virginia Duncan receiving the Reed Freshman scholarship cup, and three Balfour keys being presented to graduates. Miss Violabelle Morrow led in scholarship; Miss Francis Davis in activities, and Wiley Davis in athletics. The honor roll plaque inaugurated this year carries the names of Miss Violabelle Morrow, outstanding senior girl, and Wiley Davis, outstanding senior boy. Supt. Cook, in making the latter award, pointed out that, although Wiley had no competition for the honor, being the only boy in the class, he had truly earned it as student body president, business manager of the year book, and a four-letter man in athletics.
