Household Hints

TEA

When you are serving tea be sure to use a superior quality.

In making tea, scald the teapot before placing the tea in it. Use a teaspoonful of tea for each person and a teaspoonful for the pot. Pour boiling water on it. Use a china pot in which to make the tea. However, if you wish to use a silver teapot to serve it in, make it in the china teapot and after it has steeped, pour it into the silver teapot.

RECIPES

Stuffed Baked Potatoes

Select large white potatoes, with nice skins. Scrub and place in the oven to bake. When they are done, take them out of the oven, cut them in half lengthwise, and scoop out the potato, keeping the skin in perfect condition. Mash the potatoes, just as you do when you use boiled potatoes. Replace in the potato skins, and sprinkle a little paprika and butter on top. Place in the oven for a few minutes, so as to melt the butter and have them piping hot when ready to serve.

Salt Rising Bread

1 tablespoon salt.
1 tablespoon sugar.
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup lukewarm water.
Enough cornmeal to make a thick (pancake) batter.

A little white flour.
In the morning add about one quart of milk and water. A little butter and flour to make it stiff enough to knead. After it has been kneaded, let it raise, and then bake in an oven 350 to 400 degrees Fahrenheit, for one hour.

Have you ever tried steaming cornbread, instead of baking it? If not, try this recipe given below and I am sure you will find it very satisfying.

Cornbread

2 cups cornmeal.
1 cup flour.
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups buttermilk.
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup molasses.
Butter the size of an egg.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon soda.
Steam for one and one-half hours, and then bake for ten minutes.

DO YOU KNOW THAT?

1. By sprinkling flour over suet when chopping it, you can prevent it from adhering?
2. Soup will have a much more delicate flavor if you cut as much of the fat off the meat before putting it in the pot?
3. Slices of meat should never be used in making sandwiches? It should be chopped or minced?
