Oregon Butter Better Each Year, Tests Show

Average Oregon butter quality continued to rise during the past year, according to the seventh annual report of the monthly butter scoring and analysis service carried on by the dairy department at Oregon State college in cooperation with the Oregon Dairy Products Improvement association.

The proportion of the butter which scored 92 or better this past year increased by 9 per cent, while the amount scoring below 91 dropped nearly 7 per cent. The number of samples scoring below 90 was only 3.6 per cent during the past year, as compared with 20.5 per cent in 1929, the first year the service was conducted. On the other hand the percentage of butter scoring 92 to 94 has reached 49.5 per cent, as compared with only 7.8 per cent seven years ago.
