Beavers Hold League Leaders To 3-2 Victory

In one of the best baseball games played in Gold Hill for several years the Beavers held the league leading Crescent City Chinooks to a 3-2 victory in a nip and tuck game on the home diamond last Sunday. "Skinny" Wilson, Gold Hill pitcher and Ray Koll, Crescent City southpaw, both pitched a nice game of ball, and each registered 5 strikeouts.

The game was attended by a large crowd of Crescent City and Gold Hill fans and everybody was well pleased with the Beavers showing against Crescent City. Gold Hill players made only 2 errors thruout the game.

The first five innings of the game were scoreless. Crescent City went to work in the sixth frame and scored their 3 runs which spelled defeat for the Beavers. Crescent City started their scoring when R. Koll, pitcher, singled, but was forced out at second by Miller's fielders choice. Framstead and Miller were both safe when Coss threw high to Kell trying to force Miller at second. Matson then singled and filled the bases. Mike Koll then hit a line drive that Bailey caught in a sensational play to hold the three runners on base, with two out. Deo, second baseman, then got a two base hit to score all 3 runners which ended Crescent City's scoring for the day.

Gold Hill scored one run in the sixth when with two outs Delos Walker, beat out an infield single, stole second and scored when Clarence Kell singled to right field. Gold Hill's last run came in the 8th inning when Coss singled, and in stealing second base was hit on the head by a throw from catcher Green. The ball bounced clear into left field and Coss scored from second base.

Bullfrogs in Rogue River Are Being Wasted

About three years ago, bullfrogs, which are considered a dinner delicacy, were first noticed in Rogue River in this section. Since that time these frogs have increased and can now be heard and seen by the dozens in many sections of the river.

These edible frogs, as they should be, are protected by law the same as fish. The season for them is June 1 to April 24, they must be caught with a hook and line and the limit is 12 to a person at a time.

It is reported that someone is shooting these bullfrogs for the fun of it and letting them lay. On Sunday, May 21, Ralph Norris found six of the frogs in the slaw by the Clyde Walker ranch and in the turtle pond, which had been shot and left to rot. It might be well to remember that the guilty person if caught will be subject to fine.

It would be a fine thing if a good stock of these frogs would get started in Rogue River and anyone wasting them should be punished.

School District Buys New Bus

At the regular meeting of the school board held Monday evening, May 29, the board of directors authorized the purchase of a new 60 passenger school bus, costing approximately \$3500. The bus is a Dodge chassis mounted on a Pacific Car and Foundry body, and is one of the latest types of body manufactured.

Five bids on the new bus were submitted at the meeting Monday night and the bid accepted by the board was \$600 cheaper than any other bid. The board plans to keep the Ford bus and use it again next year.

The new bus meets all specifications of the Oregon law, has an all steel coach and all seats face the front. The three busses which have been used in the Gold Hill district during the past year have been running with over capacity loads and it was absolutely necessary to make new arrangements for transportation for the future. For the last two weeks of school one bus had to make two trips each morning and evening to bring students to school.

Two of the present bus drivers, Veltie Biles and Carl Routh were hired for next year.

The school board also received five bids at this meeting for building a new tennis court. The lowest of these bids was \$1590.00 so the board rejected all bids. The directors plan to fix the tennis court however and another meeting will be held this week for a discussion and actions on this subject.

French Attache Injured In Car Smashup Here

CAR ROLLS OVER THREE TIMES AFTER HITTING SOFT SHOULDER

Christian DeNicolay, 28, attache to the French consulate in San Francisco, and Miss Daphne Dosch Steurau, 24, both miraculously escaped injury Monday morning when their car hit a soft shoulder in front of the George Dorman home and rolled over three times. The accident occurred at about 10:30 in the morning.

The damaged car was traveling south and the driver swerved off the highway when it came abreast the Howard Drake car which was preparing to turn into the Dorman driveway. Mr. Drake had stopped on his side of the highway after giving the signal, but the Frenchman evidently thought he did not have room to pass without hitting the shoulder.

The two occupants of the car were confined to the Sacred Heart hospital for several days with scalp lacerations and bruises. The car turned over when it hit the soft shoulder and rolled over 3 times before it came to a halt on its wheels, facing back in the direction it had just come from. The top and sides of the car were crushed and all of the windows were broken.

DeNicolay and Miss Steurau were members of a party of 10 attaches of the French consulate and San Francisco residents, who were on their way to Crater Lake in four automobiles. They were traveling south on the highway, having driven from San Francisco on the Redwood highway and through Crescent City. The party was under the supervision of Miss Lillian Grunwald, artists sculptor at the French pavilion on Treasure Island.

This accident is at least the 12th to occur within two blocks in the city limits in the last eight years. The city limits is at the cement plant road but the speed limit sign is about three blocks further up the highway toward the center of town. Residents of this section are strongly urging that the highway commission change this sign to the proper city limits and believe that this will be the means of cutting down this accident rate.
