In one of the best baseball games played in Gold Hill for several years the Beavers held the league leading Crescent City Chinooks to a 3-2 victory in a nip and tuck game on the home diamond last Sunday, "Skinny" Wilson, Gold Hill pitcher and Ray Koll, Crescent City southpaw, both pitched a nice game of ball, and each registered 5 strikeouts.

The game was attended by a large crowd of Crescent City and Gold Hill fans and everybody was well pleased with the Beavers showing against Crescent City, Gold Hill players made only 2 errors thruoni the game.

The first five innings of the game were scoreless. Crescent City went to work in the sixth frame and scored their 3 runs which spelled defeat for the Beavers.. Crescent City started their scoring when R. Koll, pitcher, singled, but was forced out at second by Miller's fielders choice.
