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School Election Monday, June 19

VOTERS TO SELECT BOARD MEMBER AND CLERK AT ANNUAL MEETING HERE

The annual Gold Hill district school election will be held Monday, June 19, when residents of this section will vote for a new board member and a district clerk. The meeting will be held at the school house and will start at 2 p. m. The director will be elected to serve for a three year term and a clerk to serve for one year.

The present incumbents whose terms expire at this time are A. A. Walker, chairman of the board and Letsy Miller, clerk. Mrs. Miller has efficiently served as clerk for the past two years and she is the only candidate for the position.

Mr. Walker has been a member of the board for the past eight years and during this time has been chairman four times. During his term in office he has been very instrumental in securing a great many improvements at the local school. In the last few years the school here has improved from a 5th ranking second class school to first place. Mr. Walker states that he will not seek re election to the board.

Mrs. Paul Throne, of the Colony, is the only candidate suggested to date for the position of director. She has the backing of a great many voters and is well known throughout the community. Mrs. Throne has a son in the local school, is an active worker in the community and is believed to be well qualified for the position.

Jackson, infuriated, grabbed Spencer's arm across the edge of the ring and slapped on the pressure, returning to the ring to continue with his hammerlock for the fall.

In a baseball game that proved tight and interesting for eight innings and then turned into a rout in the ninth frame the Gold Hill Beavers bowed to the Medford Craters on the home diamond last Sunday, 12 to 3. At the first of the ninth inning Medford was leading 6 to 3 and when the visitors finally finished pounding around the base paths in this inning seven more runs were in on four hits and a flock of errors.

Skinny Wilson was rapped for nine hits in six innings and Andy Powhida, in 2 and 1-3 innings of throwing was nicked for five hits. Dusenberry pitching the last two thirds of the fatal ninth, gave up no hits.

Medford got away to a two run lead in the first inning. After Gold Hill tallied in the 2nd on a walk to Dusenberry, his stolen base and George Gitzen's wild throw to first on Coy's dribbler, and another in the third to tie the score on Wilson's double and Coss' triple, Medford came back in the fourth to go ahead 3 to 2.

The Craters picked up another in the fifth and Gold Hill's final tally came in the fifth when Coss, walked, went to second on a passed ball and scored on another error by George Gitzen.

The Craters really clinched the game in the sixth when two runs crossed the plate for a 6 to 3 advantage.

The game was bitterly fought, with the spectators and players doing a lot of jawing at each other and at the ump. Medford batters proved they couldn't take it on several occasions and did quite a bit of beefing when Piche was called out for not touching third base.
