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Salmon Poison Cure Is Announced by OSC Vets

No longer need dogs suffer and die from salmon poisoning a deadly malady confined to the western part of Washington, Oregon and northern California. The long fight to learn the cause of, and find a control for this once mysterious trouble has apparently ended with the announcement by veterinarians of Oregon State college that they have succeeded in finding a practical and economical method of producing immunity. Last year it was announced jointly by men of the state college staff and practicing veterinarians that the use of the already famous drug, sulfanilamide, would cure the disease even when it reached fairly advanced stages. Since that time the college men have conducted tests which prove that dogs that have been deliberately given a case of salmon poisoning and then cured with sulfanilamide become entirely immune to the disease.

Dr. J. N. Shaw, head of the department of veterinary medicine, and C. R. Howarth, instructor in the department, have made a detailed report of these findings in a scientific medical journal. Dr. Shaw points out that this method of producing immunity would seem to be especially practical for owners of work dogs such as Retrievers, hounds and stock dogs, as it would be possible to bring about immunity before money, time and energy are expended on training. It would also be useful to owners of dogs that must be taken on fishing and camping trips.

This drug is not considered safe for use by laymen but the treatment can be administered at reasonable cost by a practicing veterinarian. Some years ago the scientists at Oregon State college were the first to discover that salmon poisoning is caused by an internal parasite which infests trout and salmon after they reach the fresh water of Pacific coast streams. A native snail is an alternate host for this parasite. A method of producing immunity by administering blood serum was worked out but was considered too expensive for general use. The sulfanilamide treatment now overcomes that difficulty.

Local veterinarians report the successful use of this new cure in the course of experiments during the past year. The PWA program in the three states in this region in the six year period, has generated more than 40,000,000 man hours of employment for skilled and unskilled workers who earned approximately \$45,000,000 in wages on project sites. In addition, the regional office estimated, more than 30,000,000 man hours of employment in industries supplying and transporting building materials have resulted from PWA construction in the Northwest. Lumber mills, cement plants, iron foundries, steel mills and other producers and manufacturers of heavy goods received orders for approximately \$75,000,000 worth of materials required for these projects.

P.W.A. Program Creates Many Jobs in Six Years

Schools, street and highway improvements and waterworks systems have been the most popular types of projects built by communities in the Northwest with PWA assistance, with sewer systems, county and municipal buildings and hospitals ranking high on the list. The construction of college and university buildings and secondary schools has greatly improved educational facilities in this region.

Educational buildings constitute more than a third of the entire PWA construction program in the Northwest. A total of 372 projects of this type, valued at \$34,135,700, have been completed or are under construction.

"The hundreds of useful projects built in the Northwest with the aid of the Public Works Administration will be of service for years to come," C. C. Hockley, regional director, stated. "These projects have been carefully constructed of good materials, with a minimum of waste. Workers on the projects were paid fulltime wages which they spent in the communities where they were employed. Merchants and other dealers in consumer goods, as well as the construction trades and the producers of building materials, have shared in the benefits of the PWA program."

20,000 Teachers to Learn Latest Safety Methods

Twenty thousand American school teachers will learn the latest methods of teaching accident prevention this summer at a series of safety education conferences which will be conducted at 43 college and university summer sessions by the Center for Safety Education of New York University and the National Conservation Bureau, accident prevention department of the Association of Casualty and Surety Executives.

The conferences, which cover 20 states, are part of the intensified program to further reduce accidents through the application of advanced education methods and principles. Dr. Herbert J. Stack, director of the Center for Safety Education, and Miss H. Louise Cottrell, will conduct the conferences for the Center, while Kenneth N. Beadle, director of education for the National Conservation Bureau, will handle the Bureau's part of the program.

These safety education specialists will demonstrate to the attending teachers concrete methods of effectively teaching safety in the school class room and will make

available to them a comprehensive assortment of safety education materials. In their lectures, the safety specialists will discuss safety education from the social standpoint, safety attitudes and habits, organization of a safety program in a school, visual aids in a safety education program, use of safety controls, and other subjects.

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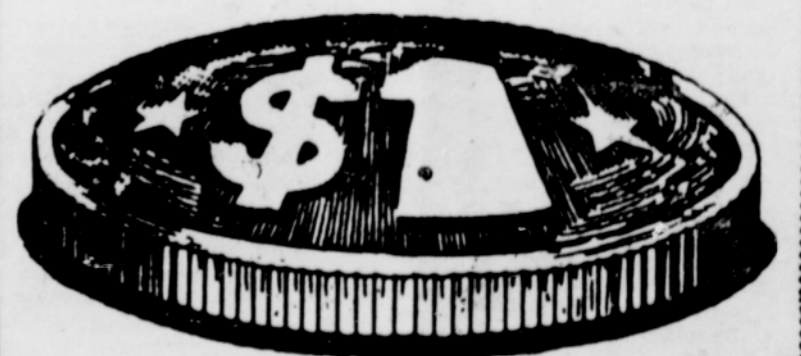
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
