the exception of Medford and Ash-1 land will be placed in one district to take effect May 2 to be known as the Jackson County school district. The governing board of this district will be made up of five elected members, each chosen from one of the five zones in the county to serve for five years.

Each district will retain its school board of three members to act as a committee to make recommendations to the county board. Under the new plan a uniform tax levy will be made over the entire county with the exception of the first class districts.

A great deal of interest has been created throughout the county over the coming election with meetings held in each of the districts to explain the proposed law.
