

**National Guards Move To Camp at Fort Lewis**

Passengers traveling on Southern Pacific trains through California, Nevada and Oregon Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of this week

probably noticed nothing particularly different from rail travel on any other day. Their trains departed and arrived on schedule, and the business of railroading was going on in the regular manner. But along the same rails was traveling one of the largest, most concentrated movements of soldiers, National guardsmen, field equipment, tanks, guns, trucks and horses in the railroad's history, en route to maneuvers of the Fourth Army in the general vicinity of Fort Lewis, Washington. The movement demonstrates once more the role of the railroads as a vital arm of the national defense. On Sunday, August 4, 23 special trains, averaging 30 to 35 cars each, were on their way simultaneously from widely scattered points in the three states, all northward

bound. And prior to this largest single day's military movement, six special trains of men and equipment were handled in the present week from Salinas, Monterey and Los Angeles. Mobilization of soldiers and war materials means also mobilization of railroad equipment, as the railroad gears in with defense plans. It means, in this instance, making available about 525 flat cars, box-cars, baggage cars and stock cars, 408 Pullman sleepers and coaches, and many extra locomotives, all at the exact time and place as needed on Southern Pacific lines. The extra freight cars and locomotives are being assembled from as far east as Ogden and El Paso and the Pullmans from all over the country. The railroad's problem has to do with arranging to man this extra equipment and to service it at each division point along the way, quickly and efficiently so that schedules may be scrupulously adhered to. And the final problem is to map out operating schedules so that the routine operation of dozens of regular scheduled passenger and freight trains will not be disturbed despite the heavy and rapid Army National Guard movements.

**School Work Program Allotted More Money**

The Oregon NYA school work program, which assists approximately 5000 boys and girls enrolled in high schools and colleges, this week was allotted \$254,727 for operation during the coming school year, according to announcement here by NYA headquarters. The allotment, to be allocated among 24 Oregon colleges and 267 high schools, supplements \$482,064 received earlier this month for operation of the NYA out of school work experience program. Ivan G. Munro, state NYA administrator, announced that as in past years, purpose of the school work program will be to help needy youths maintain themselves in school in "proper and healthful circumstances."
