Fire Destroys Cabins At Beaver Auto Court

Three of the four cabins at the Beaver Auto Court near the cement plant were completely destroyed and the fourth was badly damaged by fire which started at 3:10 Tuesday afternoon. The blaze had a good start and one cabin was' a mass of flames before the alarm was turned in. Soon after the fire truck and many volunteer fighters arrived the fire was brought under control.

The alarm was phoned in from the cement plant by Mrs. Lins Dorman who had seen the blaze from the office window.

Second hand furniture and stoves which had been stored in the cabins were destroyed but many articles were saved by people who arrived before the fire spread. The cabins belong to Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Taylor.

The fire started in a cabin which was occupied at the time by Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Jones. It is believed the blaze was caused by defective wiring. There was no insurance on the cabins.


