LONG CREEK.

A PRIEND Writes from Long Creek: "Accept congratulations on your daily edition of the East Origonian. You would have several subscribers here ex-cept for the fact that the mail route is so long that papers are nearly a week old before we get them, and the Canyon City ring vetoes all our roads to Pendleton."

What this paper loses is a small sum compared with what W. S. Byers, Alexander & Frazer, Taylor, Jones & Co., and others—these mentioned as prominent examples-lose because of this state of affairs. It is a shame that mail and merchandise cannot go and come directly between Pendleton , the nearest and best point, and the Long Creek region, which is a large, wealthy and growing settlement.

Of course Canyon City will oppose the construction of roads this way. Some little of the Long Creek business now goes that way. It is not to the interest of that town to help them out with a highway toward Pendleton. And so far as that is concerned, our county officials seem about as loath to have communication opened up between here and Long Creek as those of Grant county.

Meanwhile Arlington and Heppner are quietly and actively at work. Another season will not pass, unless the matter is taken seriously and earnestly in hand, till the Long Creek people will have a a way out, and will not ask any favors of Pendleton. We believe that the Board of Trade, at its next meeting, should appoint a committee to visit Long Creek, for the purpose of ascertaining what is now necessary to open up a highway, and what assistance can be obtained on the other end and along the route. This should be done at once, and somebody must scrifice a little time and go to a little effort to get the matter under way. To forever lose the traffic of that region on account of so slight an obstacle is a reproach, a disgrace. Let it not rest u pon us longer.
