DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

The Democratic State Convention for the State of Oregon is hereby called to meet at Pendleton, Umatilla county, on Tuesday, April 3, 1888, for the purpose of nominating a candidate for member of Congress, a candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court, six delegates to the National Democratic Convention and six alternates; to ratify the various district nominations, and such other business as may properly come before the Convention.

Said Convention will be composed of 155 delegates, apportioned to the various counties on the vote cast for candidate to Congress at the election of 1886, being one delegate for each county and one for every 200 and fraction over 100 votes so cast.

In accordance with said apportionment, the respective counties will be entitled to the following representation:

THE RANDALL BILL.

Summary of its Principal Provisions, Relating to Liquors, Iron, Cloth, Sugar, Etc.

All laws imposing internal revenue tax upon spirits distilled from apples, peaches or other fruits, are repealed from the first day of July. All laws which impose any special taxes upon manufacturers of stills, wholesale and retail liquor dealers, and wholesale and retail dealers in malt liquors, are repealed from the first of July.

Wines used, containing less than two and a half per cent. alcohol, shall not be subject to internal revenue tax. Tax on distilled spirits shall be 20 cents per gallon, and retailers are allowed to that which has paid the present tax out of the treasury.

On metals the chief changes are as follows: Copper ores, 1 1/2 cents in each pound of copper contained; old copper and clippings for manufacture, 2 cents; composition metal and ingots, plates or bars, 2 1/2 cents; iron ore 70 cents a ton, as at present. Pig iron is unchanged; bar iron, rolled or hammered, comprising flats not less than one inch solid or less than three-eighths of an inch thick, 8-10ths of 1 cent per pound; comprising round iron not less than three-quarters of an inch in diameter and square iron not less than three-quarters of an inch square, 9-10th of 1 cent; comprising flats less than one inch wide or less than three-eighths of one inch thick; round iron not less than three-fourths of one inch in diameter, and square iron less than three-fourths of one inch square, 1 cent; round iron in coils or rods less than seven-sixteenths of an inch in diameter, one and one-tenth of 1 cent; rolled iron or steel wire rods, coils or hoops, valued at 3 1/2 cents or less per pound, 1 cent; bars or shapes of rolled iron not especially enumerated or provided for in this act, 1 cent per pound, provided that all iron in slabs, blooms, hoops or other forms less finished than iron in bars and more advanced than pig iron, except castings, shall be rated as iron in bars, and pay duty accordingly; and none of the above iron shall pay a less rate of duty than 30 per cent. ad valorem; provided, further, that all iron bars, blooms, billets or sizes of shapes of any kind, in the manufacture of which charcoal is used as fuel, shall be subject to a duty of not less than 82 1/2 per cent.

There are no changes made in the present sugar schedule, except the new provision requiring sugar drainings, or sweepings, to pay duty as sugar, or molasses, to wit:

Relating to tobacco, the following changes are made: Leaf wrappers, unstemmed sixty cents, stemmed eighty cents. Unmanufactured tobacco thirty cents. Horses and mules \$10 per head; cattle \$4; hogs and sheep 50 cents; other live animals 20 per cent. Oranges in bulk \$1 75 per 1000. Hops 6 cents a pound. Salt in bags, sacks and packages 10 cents per hundred; in bulk 8 cents. The only changes made in wines, liquors, etc., is the inclusion of a new section fixing the duty on malt extracts at 20 cents per gallon in cask 40 cents in bottles and jugs, and 60 per cent ad valorem on solid extract.
