The cost of collecting the public revenues last year was only 3.16 per cent., as against 3.77 per cent. under former administrations. Frank Bollinger, an escaped convict, was shot in California by Gus Anderson, who mistook him for a mountain lion. Anderson was exonerated.

Delegates to the California State Republican Convention will be selected by open primary elections, held not in precincts, but in each assembly district. At Provo, Utah, Saturday, sixteen Mormons were sentenced for violating the provisions of the Edmunds law. Most of them were given six months in the penitentiary and fined \$300.

At Siletz Indian agency a few days ago, says the Yaguina Post, a siwash named Jake Loney, probably becoming jealous of his wife, threw her down and ran a knife into her side, making a fearful wound. A shortage of \$150,000 has been found in the accounts of the Willamette, Comm. Savings Institution, owing, it is said, to several transactions by the cashier, H. F. Royce, without the knowledge or consent of the directors.

The preachers who are in agony and rage because the President sent a copy of the constitution to the Pope, should cool off and dry their collars and get ready for the coming discussion over where Cain got his wife. During the last two hundred years the Dutch have added one million acres to the area of Holland, by reclaiming it from the sea. The work is still progressing, and it is computed that eight acres of land are daily restored to cultivation in that wonderful little country.

The Minnesota State Farmers' Alliance has created a decided sensation by issuing a two-column letter to the agriculturists and mechanics of Minnesota, charging the regents of the State university with defrauding the laboring classes out of \$800,000 given them by the United States congress for the purpose of establishing an agricultural college. One hundred and twenty thousand acres of land were given the state by congress. A number of prominent railroad people, and one or two other parties, have decided to build up a large resort at Paso Robles, California. For this purpose 800 acres of land have been bought, which includes the sulphur springs three miles from Paso Robles. This property is to be subdivided, arranged and sold in small holdings. A large, handsome hotel is to be erected; also elegant cottages, and all the buildings are to be supplied with hot water from the sulphur springs by a system of pipes.

Squaws in the Prize Ring. From the Virginia (Nev.) Enterprise. The Washoe and Piute Indians of Nevada have found out a new and congenial amusement. This is in putting their squaws against each other in rough-and-tumble fights. In these fights to rules are observed; everything goes—hair-pulling, scratching, biting, gouging of eyes and kicking are as legitimate as a blow straight from the shoulder. When two robust young squaws have been stripped to beachheads the bucks squat about them in a ring and the battle begins. In a recent battle near Jack's valley, Smoke-Creek Sam, a Piute, backed his squaw against the Manala of Big-Mouth Jim, a leading man among the Washoes. Two hundred dollars in silver and several ponies changed hands as the result. Smoke-Creek Sam's squaw was the victor, and Sam won two ponies and over \$20 in coin. The fight lasted nearly an hour, and when it ended the two squaws were covered with blood. Not much hair was left on the head of either. Big-Mouth Jim's Manala was dragged out of the ring with but little left of either ear, while Smoke-Creek Sam's squaw had one eye hanging out on her cheek.

A Lesson From Kentucky. A minority of the stockholders of the Louisville Short Route Railway Transfer Company, of Louisville, Kentucky, are jubilant over their success in outwitting Huntington and other big stockholders in the recent fight. When a transfer of one million dollars' worth of stock was made recently by General Echols and wife, the local stockholders claimed such proceeding was for the purpose of freezing them out. They drafted a bill amending the short route charter, and providing that all the offices and books shall be kept in this city, and that nine directors, residents of Kentucky, shall be elected yearly, and that each director shall hold at least twenty shares of stock. The bill passed the Senate and the House before the Huntington people knew anything about it. The Huntington people petitioned the governor to veto the measure, which he refused to do.
