REFERRING to Mr. John A. Guyer's letter in Wednesday's EAST OREGONIAN, we fail to discover any reason for criticism of our report of the convention; nor do we admit having been in error in the slightest degree. We did not say that Mr. Guyer was a candidate—only that "he was preferred by many, except that it would be unwise to take a Pendleton man." We do not know that Mr. Guyer was a candidate, in the sense of soliciting the votes of delegates; but that he had been frequently mentioned for the position by numbers of his friends he must have known.

Mr. Guyer further says:

"You must be aware of the fact that the delegates from this place were all selected upon the express understanding that they should use every effort to secure the nomination of one representative from Pendleton and the election of delegates to the State convention who would advocate the nomination of a Umatilla county man for joint Senator."

This is news to us. We never heard of it before; indeed, we supposed that not more than one—either the candidate for joint Senator or the candidate for Representative—but not both, could be taken from Pendleton. That was our idea of the matter, and we supposed it was the view of all.

As for the "promises" and "trades," we suppose there was some giving and some taking, some mutual concessions and combinations of delegates. We never saw or heard of a convention where there were not. When delegates could not get all they desired, they took as much as possible, and to get support in one direction gave some aid in another. This is always done; if it were not done, no nominations would be made.

DELEGATES from various parts of the State to the convention which meets here Tuesday need to be somewhat upon their guard, as to whose hands are entrusted the management of the approaching campaign. The State is Republican, if so at all, because of the big Republican majority in Portland—a majority obtained by vote-buying, by repression, by coercion, by all sorts of intrigue and fraud.

The Republican bosses in Portland have been largely assisted in times past by so-called Democrats, who were always ready for any sort of a deal whereby they could reap some personal advantage. No such man ought to be entrusted with power or authority.

The Republican bosses—the railroad and capitalists' attorneys—are playing for high stakes this year. Your sheriffs, and clerks, and such like officers, they care but little about; but they must have a Republican Legislature, in order to re-elect Dolph. Upon this object all their energies will be concentrated.

Perhaps it would be well for the convention to themselves elect a chairman of the State Central Committee—some man who is free from any suspicion of connection or sympathy with the Portland machine—some man, if need be, who does not live in Portland at all.

We have heard Mr. A. Bush, of Salem, spoken of as a suitable man for that position.

In such holes of filthy water as was discovered under the Coon Sing wash house on Main street, next door to the Depot Livery stable, this morning, lurk material for a hundred serious cases of sickness and probably an epidemic. Just such filth brings death. The marshal should be active in this matter, and he should be assisted as much as possible by every citizen. Such nuisances exist in Pendleton in several parts of town. If Pendleton people don't want cholera next summer, they must take precautionary measures. One of the greatest of these is cleanliness in everything, and the only one wherein absolute safety lies. Cleanliness is one of Dame Nature's superb virtues. It is compulsory on the part of every one who wishes to escape the clutches of dreadful and contagious diseases.
