when Nevada with only 50,000 people, has Statehood and two Senators?

If a few of those Philadelphia and New York and Boston editors would take a trip of observation through Dakota, Montana, Washington and New Mexico, perhaps they would begin to realize that Philadelphia, New York and Boston—not yet the great States east of the Mississippi—were not the only regions between the oceans worthy of a representation and a voice.

But to answer more specifically, in a word or two, the Times' questions: These Territories should be admitted and given a larger power and voice in national affairs because of their great extent, the variety and diversity of their resources, their wealth of agricultural and mineral products, and their sufficient and rapidly growing population. Each of them has more population than many of the other States when admitted, and the Philadelphia clan who wrote the foregoing questions may also need the information that this population will rapidly and steadily increase. The grain, the cattle and the horses, the gold and silver—and more than these, the people of these great territories are entitled to equal recognition and representation with New Hampshire, Vermont, Rhode Island, Florida, Colorado, Nevada, Oregon, or any other State, unless our system of representation is at fault altogether.

But each political party is afraid the other will gain some advantage. The Republicans want to divide Dakota and admit it as two States, thus making four more Republican United States Senators. To this the Democrats object, and we don't blame them. Senator Voorhees' proposition to admit all the four territories above named was not only justice to them in the abstract, but fair politically. Dakota is largely Republican. Montana and New Mexico are Democratic by considerable, but not large, majorities. Washington at the last two elections has returned a Democratic delegate to Congress, but on a square party vote on National issues it is undoubtedly Republican. This plan would then give neither party an undue advantage, and would give these prosperous and growing territories what they are so justly demanding.

The Philadelphia Times claim better retire within his shell and contemplate for a few years. If a hail stone should happen to drop on him he would even forget that he lived in the only place on earth worth mentioning—Philadelphia.

During his twenty years of public service he was recognized as a leader of the Republican party, and its ablest and noblest one. Proud almost to haughtiness, with immense self-esteem, he was a man of the highest integrity and honor. In New York he was for nearly two decades not only a trusted leader, but an absolute master. Against Conkling's simple word of command no one dared lift a voice. He was a politician. He believed in organization and in system; he sought to create and maintain in operation a great political machine throughout the Empire State, of which he should be the director. Yet he aimed only at party success, because he believed in the principles of his party; not at success for the mere sake of spoils. He was not venal, and he has never been accused of dishonesty in all his public life. When it was attempted to encroach upon what he considered his political prerogatives he haughtily resigned his seat in the Senate, sought a vindication by re-election, but failed, and then, abandoning politics, devoted himself to his profession.

Conkling was one of these men who, if any mortals may have had a right to be proud, and to expect deference and obedience. His noble presence and courtly bearing were not all; within there was a mighty intellect, one that has had but few counterparts in his age and generation. As an orator, he was probably without a peer in the nation at the time he flourished. As a politician and a statesman, he ranked first. As a lawyer he had few, if any, superiors.

But the proud and the mighty, as well as the weak and the humble, must alike bow. The giant mind fought well against the sudden poisoned dart, but in vain. His words, his deeds, his name, will be enshrined high on America's Temple of Fame, as one of the most illustrious of her sons.


TERRITORIAL ADMISSION.

Why should Dakota, Montana, Washington and New Mexico, with an aggregate population of less than that of the city of Philadelphia alone, come in as States and have eight votes in the United States Senate, when Philadelphia, with a larger population than that of the four new States combined, has only a fraction of one Senator? And why should these four new States, with less than the population of this city, have twelve votes in the Electoral College, in the election of a President, when Philadelphia has not half as many for her larger population?—Philadelphia Times.

This is a sample of the greedy, narrow selfishness of too many people and papers in Eastern cities. Why, then, should little Rhode Island, with its garden patch of territory and its 250,000 people, have two Senators? Or Vermont with its 325,000 inhabitants? Or what justice is there in keeping Dakota, with its 400,000 people, or Washington, with its 180,000, or Montana, with its 140,000, or New Mexico, with its 120,000, in a territorial condition,
