THE LUMBER TARIFF.

Mr. Dolph tells the United States Senate that free lumber will "destroy" the lumber business of the Pacific Coast. Isn't this pretty nonsense for a United States Senator to preach? With the exhaustless forests of Western Oregon and Washington, who can be so ignorant as to believe that lumber cannot be manufactured as cheaply there as in British Columbia, across the line? Is it the "pauper labor" of British Columbia that we are to "protect" our labor against? No; labor is as high there as here; the distance to all Oregon and Washington homes from the British possessions is greater; hence there is not a sentiment of an excuse for "protected" lumber, so far as Oregon and Washington are concerned.

But suppose the supply in our own Northwest was limited, and suppose pauper labor was employed across the line; then which should be first and most protected, the dozen, or twenty, or a hundred mill owners, or the tens of thousands of consumers of lumber? Where one man has a sawmill, a thousand men are building houses, barns, fences, implements. Mr. Dolph pleads like a hired attorney for the man with a big mill—the capitalist—but has not a word, or a thought, for the thousands who have to buy the lumber. And for that matter the same may be said of all protected industries and articles; in every case it is protection solely for the few capitalists, and robbery of the many poor consumers.

We would like to know what the people of Eastern Oregon and Washington think of Mr. Dolph's plan to keep up such a duty on lumber as will allow the combined lumber barons of Portland and Puget sound to amass their millions, while the price of lumber is put up by the lumber "trust" twenty, thirty, forty per cent. That is just Mr. Dolph's policy. He proposes to protect the lumber barons. To do so he proposes to tax with an odious tariff every man who uses lumber in any shape or form. How do the farmers, the mechanics, the merchants, the home-builders, of Eastern Oregon like the plan?

Yet every man who votes for the Republican candidates for the Legislature votes for Dolph and his lumber tax. As surely as the Legislature is Republican, so surely Dolph will be the candidate of the Portland bosses, and of the party, and so surely are the people who vote for Republicans for the Legislature voting for millionaire lumber manufacturers and impoverished home-builders.

A GOOD RECORD.

County scrip two years ago was worth 75 to 80 cents on the dollar. Now it is worth from 90 to 98 cents. The county debt has been largely reduced, beside paying a large sum due the State since 1884, delinquent in 1886 in the hands of the County Treasurer. The Sheriff's assessment has been more thorough and impartial than ever before, being over \$500,000 in addition to that assessed by the assessor. The county funds, instead of being loaned out, or invested in cattle or merchandise, have been promptly applied to the payment of outstanding warrants, and interest on every dollar stopped at the earliest possible day. The laws have both been enforced and obeyed by the officials. The record is one to which we may "point with pride." It means the election of Raley, Bentley, Hartman, Lucy and Walters.

We have received a lengthy communication from a resident of North Milton, giving "the other side" of the water-works election recently held in that town, with a request for its publication. It is not published because, first, it is a purely local matter in the town of Milton; and second, the letter is entirely too wordy and contains too many epithets. If the writer will confine himself briefly to the exact facts, his side of the matter will be published.

FUN AHEAD.

A gentleman just up from Portland says that the war in the Republican camp there is becoming interesting. It is believed that Simon will yet be forced to withdraw; or if he will not a good portion of the ticket is doomed to defeat with him. Nothing but the expenditure of a very large amount of money by the railroads, banks, and capitalists, who are determined to force Dolph into the United States Senate again, and Simon into the State Senate, can prevent the overthrow of Simon and the gang of "looters;" and the Democrats propose to put a check on illegal voting. There will be fun on election day if it is attempted, as it will be; because without it Simon and the "gang" (Oregonian) will be beaten by hundreds of votes.

It is now certain that Sewall, candidate for sheriff, resigned because of the company he was forced into, and not because of "ill health."

The Republican bosses will demand a very lavish expenditure of money by their chiefs and masters, the corporations and the money-bags, but it looks as if even that would not save them. The people of this State begin to think that they deserve a little representation as well as corporations and money-bags.

The people of Oregon generally will regret the departure of Mr. Alfred Holman, for several years assistant editor of the Oregonian. Mr. Holman is a thorough newspaper man, and will take to the Post-Intelligencer rare ability and tireless industry. We wish him continued success.

No better man for county commissioner has been named for years than R. N. Stanford. He is a good business man, a good farmer, a good neighbor, a good and honest man in every respect. He will be an improvement in the county court that we cannot afford to lose.

Improve the Long Creek road. Improve the cemetery. Improve the park. These three things Pendleton must do, or begin to do, at once, or else deserve the name of a sluggish and unenterprising town.
