WILL ENFORCE THE LAW.

The road supervisors of Multnomah county have trouble in collecting the road tax, and the strict law on the statute books is to be enforced. The latter clause of that law says:

"When a supervisor cannot find sufficient property of a delinquent out of which to make the amount of his road tax, or any part thereof, he must collect the same, or any part thereof remaining uncollected, by an action in his own name against the delinquent, in any court having jurisdiction thereof; and if judgment be given in such action against the defendant, it shall be enforced in the same manner as a judgment for a fine in a criminal action."

Sealed bids will be received at the office of the undersigned, until the 20th day of June, 1888, for the purpose of making, grading and improving certain sections of the road between Pendleton and the bridge across the North Fork of the John Day river, at the mouth of Desolation creek. Each section of the road may be bid on separately, or the whole together; the work to be completed by August 1, 1888. The work to be done is as follows: 1st. The widening of the grade from the John Day river to the top of the hill via Terrell canyon, to make a solid road of 8 feet, with turnouts 12 feet wide in sight of each other. 2d. The equalizing the grade at Bridge creek. 3d. The filling of a ravine near the 4-mile post. 4th. The removal of the rocks from the road between Camus creek and John Day river.
