As stated in the East OREGONIAN'S local columns, Judge J. H. Bird, of The Dalles, was sent for to try the contest case between the two candidates for the clerkship. As is well known, Mr. Hartman only wanted a recount of the South Pendleten vote, but Mr. Young wouldn't agree to the proposition, and the contest was instituted to obtain such a recount of the ballots. It was desired by Mr. Hartman that the matter should be settled as quickly as possible, and as the law .85 on plainly states that a case of this kind may be tried during vacation, Mr. Bird was sent for to hear the argument, because of the inability of Mr. Walker to try the case.
