A FRANK REPUBLICAN PAPER.

This from the Philadelphia Times, one of the ablest Republican papers in the country, being edited by Alexander McClure, will give the readers an idea how the tide is running for tariff reform in the East:

"If Judge Kelley will take the Republican wooden manufacturers of Republican Philadelphia into his confidence, every one of them will admit that free wool is a necessity to meet the changed condition of that industry, and all would say so publicly but for the fear that the wool growers would retaliate upon woodmen. If Judge Kelley will take the Republican Philadelphia iron men into his confidence, every one of them will tell him that free iron would greatly benefit the iron trade; that the ores imported are a necessity to produce iron for the present markets; that free iron would cheapen their product and enlarge both protection and consumption, and all would say so publicly but for the fear of retaliation upon iron. If Judge Kelley will take the Republican iron men of Philadelphia into his confidence, he will be told that tin should be absolutely free; that it cannot be manufactured here even at an increase of 100 per cent duty; that it is an oppressive tax upon the small growers and homes of the land, and all would say so but for the fear that they may be classed as apostates to protection. If Judge Kelley will take the coal men of Philadelphia into his confidence, they would tell him that free coal with Canada would enlarge our coal markets five million tons a year and admit probably five hundred thousand from Nova Scotia to New England to aid the languishing manufacturers of that section, and all would say so openly but for the fear of retaliation upon their consumers in iron and steel. If Judge Kelley will take into his confidence the Republican builders of Philadelphia, they would tell him that free lumber would relieve the whole people from a most oppressive tax, and they would say so in public but for the fear of assailing the protective policy to which they are devoted. If Judge Kelley will take sugar Eitter into his confidence, he will learn that the Eitter sugar mill can manufacture the entire home production of the United States in half the year, he will be told that sugar should be free and he would be told to confine but for the fear of retaliation upon the manufacturer produced."

Republican papers are now publishing articles headed, "How to carry Indiana." Here also they have a good deal to do with the fact that Indiana was Republican and there was no doubt about it. We are glad to see that they are no longer foolish enough to set claim to the earth, and instead, are looking around them for means to wrest the state from "the disreputable, malignant, corrupt, ignorant, fool Democrats." The Cleveland Owl will turn its attention to "How to carry Indiana" as soon as it is through abusing the South and everything connected with it as seen through the spectacles of an ignorant, prejudiced man, who has never been in the South, nor still is acquainted with all its faults and virtues, and from this what he does not acquaintance thinks himself capable of being the South's critic. Nothing but a foolish, conceited man would so exalt himself. It reminds one of the man who has never been to hades, but knows all about that favored realm. He is the editor of the Owl, and that alone makes him infallible.
