AN INSTRUCTIVE TABLE.

Will the voters please study this table carefully? The first column names certain articles consumed by all people. The second gives the average price of an average article, as at present taxed.

It will be observed that a farmer purchasing \$600 of the necessities of life now pays a tax of \$383.66. The majority of the goods enumerated are manufactured in this country, hence nearly all of this \$383.66 goes into the pockets of the manufacturers as clear profit.

Mr. Mills and the Democracy merely propose to cut the tariff tax on \$600 worth of goods down from \$383.66, as at present, to \$253.73, and save purchasers \$129.93. What an awful calamity that would be!

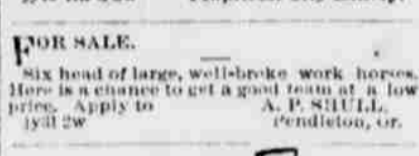

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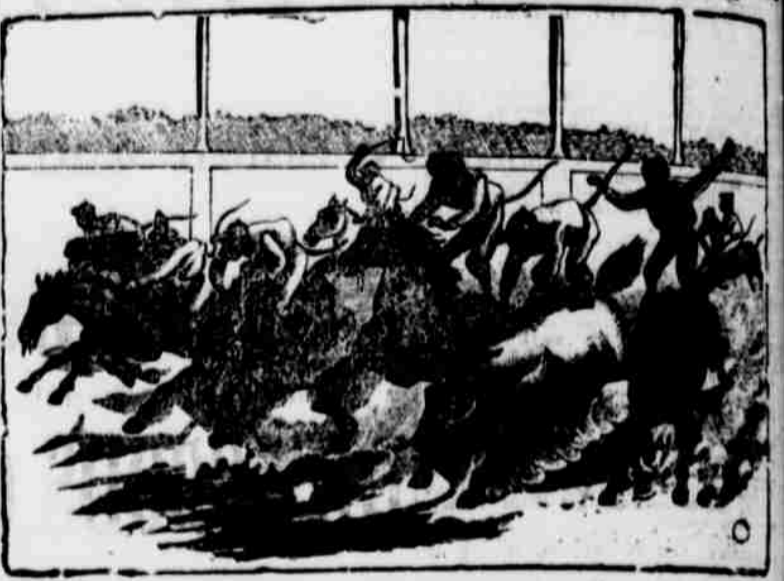
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
