THE SCHNELLER CASE.

For some time the Portland News has had three of Lawson's detectives from San Francisco investigating the circumstances of the death of Mary Schneller, who was found in a dying condition in Mrs. Dr. Murray's office last July, and last Friday a detailed report of the facts elicited was published in the News.

From the facts elicited it is impossible to doubt that the girl was killed by an abortion being performed upon her; and it is also certain that the crime was committed in the building, and probably in the room, where she died, and very shortly before her decease. A dozen or more reputable physicians say that in her condition, as developed by the autopsy, she could not have walked, nor even stood upon her feet, after the operation was performed.

The report also deals with the manner in which the case against Mrs. Murray was treated in the grand jury room. The most important witnesses were not called at all, and those who were called were questioned by the prosecuting attorney in such a way as to do the accused no harm. McGinn, the prosecuting attorney, is a partner of Simon, who is Mrs. Murray's attorney, and with whom he divides his fees. Simon is also police commissioner.

It is apparent from this case that whether punishment follows crime in Portland depends upon the size of the accused's purse. For a long time it has been remarked that justice was an out-forgone farce in Portland, in criminal matters; and this case seems to fully warrant the charge.

The Oregonian, which is now a complete member of the corrupt ring, has no word of condemnation for the murder of Mary Schneller, but assists in proving that Wilcox, the News editor, is a black-mailer for exposing the crime.

In 1882 the Indiana Republican platform had this plank:
"That a revenue greatly reduced in amount being all that is now needed to pay the interest on our public debt and the expenses of the Government economically administered, the time has arrived for such a reduction of taxes and regulation of tariff duties as shall raise no more money than shall be necessary to such interest and expenses. We, therefore, approve of the efforts now making to adjust this reduction so that no unnecessary burdens upon the consumers of imported articles may exist, and that no injury may be inflicted upon our domestic industries, or upon the industrial classes employed therein."

A DISPATCH of Saturday from Boston says:

"There has been another good amount of business in wool this week. Sales were large, amounting to 3,850,100 pounds of all kinds. Large sales of territory wools are reported, amounting to 1,140,100 pounds. Choice Wyoming and Montana sold at 23 cents, and other sales mainly in the range of 16c to 19 cents. California spring wool was more active, with sales of 420,000 pounds at 15c to 21 cents, including choice Humboldt and Mendocino. Texas and other unwashed wools were dull. Pulled wools were in steady demand at previous prices."

HANSON CRAIG, of Kentucky, is probably the largest man in the world. His weight is given at 792 pounds, and it requires 37 yards of cloth to make him a suit. He is 6 feet 4 1/2 inches in height, is 31 years old and weighed 11 pounds at birth. When two years old he took a \$1,000 prize at a baby show in New York, tipping the beam at 206 pounds at that time. His father weighed 115 pounds and his mother 122.

The increase of 14,000 in the total vote of Maine is not warranted by any increase in the population. That increase is in the counties on the Canadian line, where the Republican vote swells. It is cast by imported Canadians, who have crossed the line to help Mr. Blaine out. There is no other explanation of it.

R. F. TUCKER, a partner of the firm of J. B. Brewster & Co., carriage manufacturers at No. 143 East Twenty-fifth street, New York City, who voted for every Republican candidate for the Presidency from Lincoln to Blaine, now renounces his alliance to that party on account of its war-tax prohibitory-tariff policy and declares his intention to vote for Cleveland and Thurman and a reduction of the tariff.

THERE is a good deal of land in Umatilla county excellently adapted to the raising of broom-corn. It can be raised with success on the light, dry land not well adapted to wheat. If some of the farmers in the Echo and Nolin region would try it, and some enterprising person would start a broom factory in Pendleton, there would be a mutual benefit.

THE Portland Telegram thinks it possible that the Republicans may carry Florida, based on the hope that the yellow fever, which attacks the whites chiefly, and not many negroes, will kill off a large number of Democratic voters before November.

MARY GOODWIN, a negro woman, the youngest of a family of thirty-seven children and the mother of twenty-seven, was recently arrested in Atlanta for fighting. She gave her age 38, and her appearance did not belie the statement.

BLAINE telegraphed to Whitelaw Reid that the result of the election in Maine was a great success, almost a revolution. The same sort of a "revolution" will give New York to the Democrats by at least 25,000 majority.

ALTA: The Call objects to Polk's Oregon line treaty. What has the Call to say about Powhatan's attempt to knock John Smith's brains out? While we are at these important matters let us clear the docket.

JOHN B. ALLEN, Republican candidate for delegate in Washington Territory, is a good and able man, but he ought to be defeated, if for no other reason, because he is an ardent woman-suffragist.

THE Portland Telegram says the Republican nomination in Washington Territory "is tantamount to an election." The record of 1884 and 1886 do not indicate that such is the case.

BISHOP IRELAND, of the diocese of Minnesota, who in 1884 used his great influence for Mr. Blaine, is now heartily at work for the Cleveland and Thurman ticket.
