MORE NEWS FROM NEWARK.

From San Francisco papers we obtain more detailed news of the election in Newark last Tuesday.

The dispatch published in the Examiner is as follows:

"Newark, Oct. 9.—We carry Newark, N. J., on a popular vote by 525 majority, a net gain over 1884 of 2,029 votes.

The New York dispatch which embodied the above from Newark says:

"The Democrats are exultant over the Newark election. It is the home of laboring men and a manufacturing center.

"This is considered the strongest protection city in the State, and the Republicans were determined to make it appear that the free-trade scare was really working.

"From the present indications the city will probably go 1,200 majority for the Democrats. In 1884 the city gave Blaine 1,500 majority."
