MORE NEWS FROM NEWARK.

From San Francisco papers we obtain more detailed news of the election in Newark last Tuesday. The result is a far greater victory for the Democrats than was apparant in the dispatch published in the Oregonian, in which paper we sometimes get correct political news, and sometimes we don't.
