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POLITICAL BARBARISM.

One of the sure signs by which brute ferocity of nature may be distinguished in the human animal is the disposition to kick an enemy when he is down, to exult with upbraiding and insulting epithets a vanquished foe.

In most civilized warfare, even the warfare with deadly arms and weapons, this disposition is no longer manifest. When an enemy, after an honorable battle, has been defeated, all civilized nations and captains would regard it as an ineffaceable stain upon their own honor to mutilate or insult and vilify, by deed or word, the conquered foe.

The Portland Oregonian is one of these savage squaws of political warfare, whose chief delight is in poking sharp sticks into the defeated Democracy and its candidates, after the battle has been won in spite of the hideous and demoniacal old squaws rather than by their assistance.

This noble specimen of American journalism says that President Cleveland is not "a man," but a rhinoceros, all horn and hide. Such remarks are only worthy of notice because they exhibit the bitter gall, the intolerant partisan bigotry, the murderous savagery, the malicious inhumanity of the brute who wrote them.

Mr. Cleveland is defeated, it is true. It may be that he deserved defeat. But it is still true that nearly half of the voters of this country preferred him to the other candidate. But in the estimation of these Hydes in politics, they are all traitors, and fit for nothing but banishment or death.

The EAST OREGONIAN despises such a sentiment, and such souls as those fiendish assassins. It has respect for the opinions and voice of half—be it a little more or less—of the people of this country. It has respect for the President of the United States, fairly elected, whatever his politics. It has too much respect for itself to call Mr. Harrison a snail, or a toad, or a cockroach, in return to a paper which covers its columns with the gall of a demon's soul.

It is curious how often apparent failure is often sweet success, and apparent disaster real blessing.

Many a town and city are far more prosperous, slightly and wealthy to-day because of some conflagration, which at the time of its occurrence was regarded as an immense calamity. Many a man, who has failed and been "ruined" financially in one sort of business, or one line of operation, has been thereby thrown into some other occupation, or on different lines, and achieved a splendid success.

Nothing so brings out the true, sterling qualities of a man, a party, or a people, as a good ducking in cold water.

The Democratic party has had a cold bath; it is not drowned.

Mr. Cleveland, with all his faults, had also many redeeming qualities, and his message on the tariff question, although ridiculed by many to-day, may yet prove the key note to what will be our administration's policy, before many years glide by. This tariff question is like an endless chain. There will be no end to it until our tariff system is thoroughly revised.—Walla Walla Journal.
