The Tape Worm in Sheep.

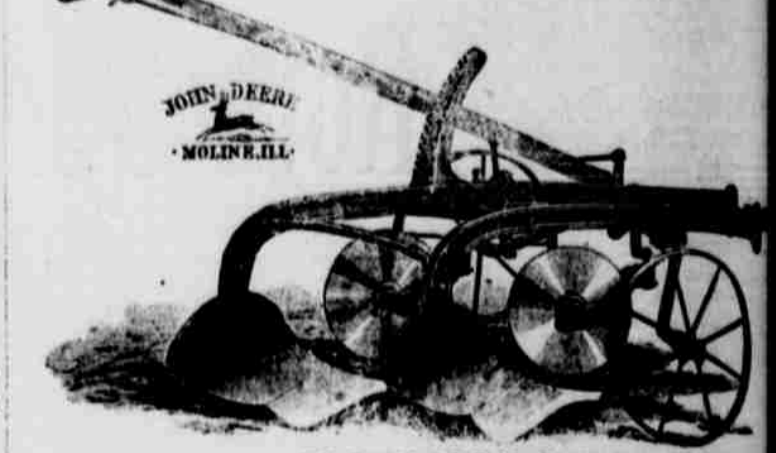
