A Secret Marriage Sustained

A case involving the validity of a se-cret marriage has just been decided by the Nebraska Supreme court.

The suit was brought by the wife. She alleged that she and her husband had been secretly married in Chicago. The ceremony was performed by a man who, as she supposed, was a minister, but she had never seen him before and did not know his name. There were no wit-nesses present. The marriage was kept a secret for more than two years.

The husband denied that there ever had been a marriage, or that any ceremony had been performed. He admitted that he had on more than one occasion acknowledged the plaintiff as his wife, and had known of her telling her family that they had been married, but he explained that this was done as a mere clock to avoid scandal. avoid scandal.

The court decides the case, which was a suit to have the wife's marital status and rights established, in favor of the complainont. It accepts her story, which was corroborated by other direct and circumstantial evidence, and holds that the marriage, though contracted in secret, and long kept a secret, was valid in law.


