

Winter Care of Dairy Cows.

Winter is approaching and it is the proper time to talk about the winter care of farm stock, especially when any preparation is needed. In order for dairy cows to do their best they should have early cut hay, or as Mr. Terry says, "dried grass" in abundance, supplemented with plenty of good, bright fodder corn, also corn, oats and oil meals, and plenty of bran. As a rule dairymen understand the quantities of each for a ration of two feeds per day. In feeding for butter expressly, a good proportion of corn meal will give the best results.

No herd of cows can be comfortable in a cold barn or stable, lying on the bare floor, constantly accumulating fertilizing material every time they lie down. It is almost impossible to keep cows clean on a level stable floor. The floor should have three inches slant toward the tight gutter in the rear, made expressly for holding all liquids and solids. With plenty of good bedding and proper care cows can be kept clean. The card and brush should be used daily. When once broken in, cows enjoy it. A good clean herd of cows, with their hair all smooth, lying in the right direction, their sides and udders free from filth of all kinds, is a beautiful sight to look upon. One can take pleasure in sitting down and milking such cows.

"But," says one, "I have no time to spend brushing and currying." Just try the experiment and satisfy yourself. Another says, "I don't believe C. W. K. practices what he recommends to others." Any one is at liberty to step into my stable and see. I shall be glad to show them that cows when stabled can be kept clean, which is very essential to their comfort. I also have the satisfaction of having clean milk. One can take pleasure in sitting down and milking such cows, and when he gets through he has a pailful of milk that is free from what some call "animal odor." The true secret of having good milk and butter is first in good feeding, second in keeping the cows and stables as clean as possible, third in care and watchfulness while milking. There is plenty of time for silent reflection, and I am not sure but it would be proper to silently meditate upon some of our past mistakes or misdeeds, if we have been guilty of any such! I often see the dairy cow carrying about more fertilizing material in winter than is absolutely necessary for her comfort or convenience. I sincerely believe that if she could make a few remarks upon the matter she would declare this fertilizing business burdensome and overdone.
