A great many people who are obliged to live at hotels and boarding houses have to go withot some of these common articles of food, almost the year round, and at the same time farmers and their families are "running bills" at stores for goods which they must pay wheat money for, while with a little effort and management they could pay all their store bills as they go along with pork, poultry, but-

THE SCHOOL-BOOK OFFSTION.

The Salem Statesman, along with a lowing Cabinet suggestion: number of other Oregon journals, is protesting against a change of school books. Maine, It says that

"it is reliably reported that the school book monopoly has been successful—that they have succeeded in securing the votes of some twenty out of twenty-nine county school superintendents in the State for a change of readers, substituting for those gow in use another series published by the school-book trust; and that for the Fish series of arithmetics they have corraled some fifteen, or a majority of the votes, throwing out the Brooks series now in use; and that they have succeeded in getting a majority of the votes for all the new text books adopted since the last vote was taken four years ago."

The Statesman proceeds to severely criticise the school-book "trust"-which we suppose, however, is an "entirely private affair"-and insinuates that the votes of some school superintendents have been obtained by improper influences

"In the case of an Eastern Oregon superintendent he had made up his mind that the Fish arithmetics were the best, and so informed a valley superintendent, as early as July 1st, before he had seen the books at all. In the case of a Southern Oregon structure. a Southern Oregon superintendent he had so made up his mind just after his return from the national teachers' convention at San Francisco, and was very lavish with funds, though he had before been very hard pushed to meet his bills. There are other instances of premature or sudden conversions to the advocacy of a new series of readers and of Fish's arithmetics—and the fact is, if the people will, through their representatives, take occasion to sift this thing to the bottom, it will turn out that this fish is a large-
