THE R. R. COMMISSION'S REPORT.

The report of the Oregon Railroad Commission is at hand. It is a lengthy and instructive pamphlet, and gives a great deal of information which will be aluable to the Legislature soon to meet. Some have said that the Commission ias been a costly but useless piece of nachinery, having really accomplished nothing. We think the Commissoners, hough the law has not proved to be all hat was hoped and expected of it, have fully earned their salaries, and have tone a work so far which is of great senefit to the people of Eastern Oregon. · letter from Mr. Holcomb, published n the report, declares that the eduction made on wheat shipped rom Eastern Oregon and Washington to Portland last season alone saved to the producers the sum of \$165,000. The O. R. & N. Co., however, did not reduce its rates as much as the commission demanded, as it should have done, as shown by its freight earnings for 1888, which are \$570,970.11 over 1887. Therefore it is now evident that since this company has not complied with a reasonable deman of the commission, further legislation is necessary.
