RALEY IN THE EAST END.

A correspondent says the Senator-elect
Has Made a Good Impression.

A correspondent writes as follows
regarding Senator Railey's interviews
with his constituents in the East End:

The Hon. Jas. Railey has interviewed
his constituents in the east end of
Umatilla county in regard to their wants.
Without pledging himself for any cer-
tainty he has been able to satisfy all,
as to his honest intention to serve the
people in an equitable manner.

At an informal meeting held in the
Masonic hall at Weston, he was asked to
use his influence to amend the charter of
the city of Weston so that they may be
allowed to issue bonds to the amount of
\$10,000, for the purpose of building water
works for the city, also asking the aid of
the legislature in the establishment of a
normal school, and presenting in proper
form the inducements they are able to
offer. The question of the division of
the county was much discussed, and
while most seemed favorably impressed
with the idea, there was no union in
regard to party lines, and it was really
left to his decision, with the proviso that
if division was inevitable they were in
favor of what is known as the Lee county
line.

The Price of Grains.
The difference between the local and
general market price for wheat was prob-
ably never so noticeable in this section as
at present, when 75 cents is paid by the
flouring mills for wheat, while it is worth
but 64 cents for shipment, according to
the quotations of the great marts of the
world. Wheat is a scarce article in any
locality, and difficult to obtain at any
price. All classes of grains are high in
price. The local market, barley and oats com-
manding a cent a pound and over, hav-
ing steadily increased in price during the
past month. The local demand is greater
than the supply, causing a steady rise in
price.

HOW TO RAISE REVENUE.

Mr. J. E. Kirkland Would Allow no Ex-
emptions or Deductions Whatever.
MILTON, Or., Jan. 1, 1889.
To the Editor of the East Oregonian.

I have not been indifferent to the ques-
tions contained in your circular of Decem-
ber 3d last.

Viewed from a natural standpoint as-
essment and taxation are arbitrary mat-
ters, and are hard to control by legisla-
tion, but of course are necessary for civil
governments, and can only be regulated
by law.

1. How can a full and fair assessment
of property be secured?
I reply, by assessment of all property
of any value whatever, both real and
personal, except church property, without
exemption of indebtedness. This dis-
poses of, so far as my views are con-
cerned, the first, second, sixth, and
eighth questions.

2. Are you in favor of a State Board of
Equalization?
I am not, but want of time forbids a
discussion of the matter.

3. Are you in favor of precinct instead
of county assessors?
I answer this in the affirmative, with-
out hesitancy.

4. Are you in favor of a graduated in-
come tax?
I give this a negative reply.

5. Do you think the bill prepared by
the tax commission of 1886 an improve-
ment upon our present law?
I do not; and as to the latter clause in
this question, referring to a change in
said bill, I am not prepared, without fur-
ther consideration, to say what would be
commendable.
