DONE A GOOD WORK.

Even the big paper of Portland, The Oregonian, and the only genuine newspaper in the State, has a good word for the New Year's edition of the EAST OREGONIAN. Here is what it says editorially of the issue:

"The EAST OREGONIAN, published at Pendleton, issued a very good New Year's number. Besides its usual news sheet, it gave eight pages devoted to the large section of country of which Pendleton is the principal business center. In this review a great deal of new and valuable matter was presented. There was also a page of illustrations, containing in the center a good and general view of the town of Pendleton, while the borders of the sheet were decorated with pictures of the attractive special features of the town. The EAST OREGONIAN has done a good work for Pendleton and the surrounding country."

The E. O. Man returns his gentle thanks for this, for he did not expect it.

Let every citizen of Pendleton remember that the monthly expenses of the publication of the EAST OREGONIAN are \$1250, paid out in good hard coin. Of this amount only \$250 are spent outside of the town, leaving a circulating medium of \$1000, which goes into all the business channels of Pendleton. Business men and others who pay it a few dimes or dollars for subscription or advertising, should not begrudge the money, as the EAST OREGONIAN gives full value for all it receives. It is no charity patient and never will be. At present the daily paper is not self-sustaining and will not be until it enjoys a circulation of 500, and an advertising patronage of \$500 per month.

With Hunt's road here and the reservation lands sold, it expects to reach its goal, but in the mean time, the people of Pendleton particularly, and those of the county generally, are requested to give it the support it deserves.

A WASHINGTON special says that John F. Swift, of California, will probably be a member of Harrison's cabinet. If Mr. Swift has the capacity to be a cabinet officer then we, although following an humble calling, should aspire for the office of governor of the State of Oregon. Mr. Swift made a speech in Pendleton during the June campaign of last year. He will always be remembered here as making the poorest speech of the campaign.

In the case of the United States vs. the State of California, involving the question of the right of the State to indemnity for school lands to compensate it for deficiencies in fractional townships made so by reason of swamp lands found therein, the secretary has reversed the decision of the commissioner of the general land office, and sustained the validity of said selections.

Mr. J. M. ADAMS is now the editor of the Spokane Falls Review. He was at one time the editor of the Yakima Signal and made a good paper of it. He held office under President Cleveland and has now gone back to his first love, the newspaper business.

Spokane Falls has made another step toward great growth. Her unrivalled water power is to be developed and leased for a term of years to manufacturers at low rates.

The Times-Mountaineer's New Year's edition was a grand success, the only fault being there was not enough of them printed to supply the demand. Shake, Brother Michell.

SENATOR DOLPH on Thursday introduced in the Senate an amendment to the river and harbor bill for the appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the commencement of a boat railway at the Dalles and Cello falls in the Columbia river, the improvement of Three and Ten-Mile rapids, and the widening of the channel, in accordance with plans and recommendations which will be submitted to a board of engineers appointed by the secretary of war, under the provisions of the act of August 11, 1888.

AN OBJECTION ANSWERED

Pendleton Has Over 5,000 Law Books—The Salem Statesman's Opinion.

The following communication from Pendleton recently appeared in the Salem Statesman:

"In a recent issue of your paper you suggested that about the only objection to holding a term of the supreme court annually in this part of the State is the lack of sufficient law books. I desire to remove any opposition that may exist on that point. The Pendleton bar generally have good libraries. I have counted the volumes of law books in some of the libraries, and estimated them in others, and I am satisfied that there are in this city more than five thousand volumes of law books, including the United States supreme Court reports, and the reports of twelve of the principal States; the West Publishing Company's reports (complete), covering every Federal, State, and Territorial court; the Lawyer's Co-operative System of Reports (complete); the American Decisions, and numerous digests and text books. There are, also, good libraries at Union, Baker City, and The Dalles. Attorneys desiring to use books not found here could get them elsewhere."

"I am convinced that the law libraries in this part of the State are much more extensive than elsewhere in the State outside of Portland excepting, of course, the State library."

"Eastern Oregon is, I think, entitled to a term of the supreme court annually. The supreme court of our sister State of California holds terms at Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles. It is not right to compel the people of Eastern Oregon to go to the capital to try their cases. By the usual routes of travel, a person going from Grant, Malheur, or Walla Walla counties to Salem and returning, will have to travel about one thousand miles. I believe that there will be very little, if any, opposition to giving us a term of the supreme court, when the facts are known. I might add that the only opposition that I know of in this part of the State is made by a Baker City paper edited by a 'carpet-bagger.'"

The Statesman comments on the above as follows:
A correspondent at Pendleton presents the case fairly as to the expediency of providing for a term of supreme court of the state annually in Eastern Oregon. It appears to be only a matter of justice to the people of that section, and no doubt the legislature will accede to their wishes when the subject is properly presented to that body. The completeness of some of the law libraries in Eastern Oregon, particularly at Pendleton, as shown by our correspondent, is very gratifying, and removes the only objection to the measure that has been mentioned.

Notice to Daily Subscribers.
