THE adjourned meeting of the citizens of Pendleton who are interested in the Hunt railroad matter is to be held this evening at the Court House. Owing to Mr. Hunt's promise to come over soon and locate the route, the committees have not been as active at work as they might have been; but all should come out, nevertheless, and talk the situation over again, and report what progress has been made and see what the prospects are.

RESOLUTIONS.

What the Umatilla County Grangers Desire of the Legislature.

We, the undersigned, the committee appointed by Umatilla County Grange to consider various resolutions submitted by subordinate granges, and to formulate and adopt resolutions to be presented to the next legislature, hereby submit the following:

To the members of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon for Umatilla County:

We hereby adopt and endorse the following resolutions passed by Vansycle Grange No. 221, viz.:

"Resolved, That we respectfully petition our Senators and Representatives in the State Legislature to use all honorable means to enact a law regulating the practice of medicine in this State.

"Resolved, That they are requested to use their best endeavors to enact a law compelling all men doing business as butchers, or others slaughtering cattle for market, to keep a record of all marks and brands of cattle purchased, and the names of parties from whom purchased; also to retain the hides of all cattle slaughtered for a period of thirty days, open to inspection by all persons who wish to examine the same, and providing a severe penalty for the violation of this law.

"Resolved, That as certain parties who are interested in town property at the town of Milton are agitating a division of Umatilla county, therefore we, as farmers and taxpayers of the proposed new county, declare ourselves as emphatically opposed to any division of Umatilla county at this time, and urge our representatives to leave the question of division to a vote of the people of Umatilla county."

We also endorse and adopt the following resolutions by Juniper Grange No. 212, at a regular meeting held Dec. 27th, 1888, to-wit:

"Resolved, That we are in favor of precinct assessors, and demand a fair assessment of all real and personal property.

"Resolved, That we favor the continuance of the Railroad Commission, believing their services have been beneficial to the State of Oregon.

"Resolved, That, as the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon has decided that the State has no valid title to the Agricultural farm at Corvallis, the same being the property of the M. E. Church, South, we request the legislature to discontinue all appropriations to said institution, and provide some means whereby the State shall be provided with an Agricultural College.

"Resolved, That we demand of our legislature a ballot reform law."

We also adopt the following in behalf of said Umatilla County Grange:

Resolved, That we are in favor of a change in the assessment and taxation laws, so as to provide for precinct assessors; and that taxes, after they become delinquent shall bear interest at the rate of twelve per cent; and that a county and State board of equalization be provided for.

Resolved, That we favor a change in the road law, providing for publication of petition for a new road or change of road in a newspaper in the county, instead of requiring the petition or notices to be posted up as now required by law.

Resolved, That we endorse Senate Bill No. 9, of the last session, also Senate Bill No. 70, of the last session, introduced by Senator J. P. Wager.

Resolved, That we are in favor of a homestead law, exempting a homestead from attachment and execution to the extent of two thousand dollars.
